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## **FOREWORD**

Development aid and expertise have assumed special significance for the countries of the South vis-a-vis their resource constraints and lack of capacity to plan, develop and implement projects and programs. The role of donor and development agencies becomes pivotal as they help the developing and the under-developed worlds overcome their obstacles to socio-economic progress. The recent past indicates that international agencies not only provided financial support but also a wide range of technical and administrative facilities with regard to the afore-mentioned limitations of the developing countries.

Capacity Africa Institute has put together this funding resource in response to the growing demand for development aid in Africa and beyond. The organizations included in this Directory have their focus on diverse areas such as poverty alleviation, science and technology, health, population and industrial and agricultural development. The profiles of the organizations have been arranged in terms of their work/operation, the long-term organizational objectives and the programs and projects currently being undertaken by them.

Below is a list of donor categories available in this donor directory:

### **International Foundations:**

Foundations are independent entities in the business of making grants to NGOs and community-based organizations. Often they derive their income from an endowment, a wealthy benefactor, a corporation or constant fund raising. Examples of international foundations include: the Asian Development Trust (Japan), W.K. Kellogg Foundation (United States), Kaiser Family Foundation (United States), the Ford Foundation (United States), the Bernard van Leer Foundation (Netherlands), Fundación CODESPA (Spain), the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation (United States), the Rockefeller Brothers Foundation (United States), the Well come Trust (United Kingdom), Fondation de France (France), Fondation Roi Baudouin (Belgium), the Soros Network of Foundations/Open Society (United States), and the Aga Khan Foundation (Switzerland).

### **Global Corporations**

Many global companies demonstrate their social responsibility by supporting projects in communities where they operate. Examples include: ABB ASEA Brown Boveri Ltd., (Switzerland), AEGON NV (Netherlands), Bertelsmann AG (Germany), Robert Bosch (Germany), Citibank (United States), Coca-Cola (United States), Deutsche Bank (Germany), H. B. Fuller (United States), Honda (Japan), Grand Met (United Kingdom), Imetal (France), Levi Strauss & Company (United States), Microsoft (United States), J.P. Morgan (United States), Odebrecht (Brazil), Shell (Netherlands), and Sony (Japan).

### **International Non-Governmental Organizations**

International NGOs are global charities that raise funding from a variety of sources, including the public, to support projects in the developing world. Sometimes they are specialist organizations focusing on health, agriculture, emergency relief, environment, education, community development, or micro lending, or a combination of areas. Examples of such organizations include: Action Aid (United Kingdom), CARE (United States), Concern Worldwide (Ireland), Helvetas (Switzerland) Intermon (Spain), Norwegian People's Aid (Norway), Groupe Developpment, (France), Medecins Sans Frontieres (France), Oxfam (United Kingdom), PLAN International (United Kingdom), Save the Children (United States), and Terra des Hommes (Switzerland).

### **International Church-Based or Religious Organizations**

Many churches and religious organizations fund a broad range community development projects. Examples of such organizations include the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (United States), Christian Aid (United Kingdom), Caritas (Germany), Catholic Relief Services (United States), Evangelische Zentral stelle für Entwicklungshilfe, EZE (Germany), Interkerkelijke OrganisatieVoor Ontwikkelingssamenwerking (Netherlands), Brotfür die Welt (Germany) and World Vision (United States). In addition to the above institutions, it is important not to overlook host country sources for your project.

**Government Sources**, such as the ministries or departments of health, education, and public welfare, and provincial and local government sources.

**Local Businesses**, such as banks, real estate companies, service and industrial companies, etc., and local subsidiaries or partners of multinational corporations.

**Local Independent Foundations and Trusts**, such as the KI Foundation (Singapore), Fundação Vitae (Brazil), Fundación Amparo (Mexico), Fundación Social (Colombia); CP Foundation (Thai), and the Kagiso Trust (South Africa).

**Community Foundations** Community foundations are independent, grant making organizations that mobilize resources from a variety of sources, including the public. Such foundations are dedicated to addressing critical societal needs and on improving the quality of life of specific segments of a community in a limited geographic area. Examples of such foundations include the Kenya Community Development Foundation (Kenya), the Community Development Foundation (Mozambique), Oaxaca Community Foundation (Mexico), the Rustenburg Community Foundation, (South Africa), and the Healthy City Community Foundation (Slovak Republic).

**Service Clubs and Membership Association.**

Local service clubs and membership organizations are often another source of funding for local projects. Examples of such associations include; Rotary International, Lions Clubs International, chambers of commerce, and trade associations of specific industries.

## **BACKGROUND TO FUNDRAISING**

### **Importance of registration**

It is important to register your organization as a legal entity. Most, if not all funders, require that each organization they fund be officially registered with the government as a non-profit organization.

### **The registration process**

There are several things you need to consider before you decide to register your Organization.

#### **●Constitution**

A Government agency will only register a properly set up legal entity, with a founding document such as a constitution. This document must explain what your organization will do, how it will be structured, and how it will be run.

- ***Type of organization.***

Your organization will need to make a decision about the type of non-profit organization it would like to form. There are several different types such as Non-Governmental Organizations, Community Based Organizations, a Society or Faith Based Organizations etc.

- ***Choice of legal entity***

Be aware that while many donors will fund any type of non-profit organization, others will only fund registered NGOs.

- ***Opening a bank account***

A funding organization cannot give you funding without a bank account. Therefore, if you are a new organization you will need to open one.

### **Benefits of registering**

- Registering helps in finding ways of getting benefits like tax incentives and funding opportunities.
- Registering brings your organization into a formal system.
- Registering makes your organization accountable to a public office, which in turn improves its credibility.

### **Understanding the donor climate**

When it comes to obtaining assistance from donors, there are three basic rules to consider:

- Familiarize yourself with current trends in the donor environment.
- Understand whether you match the objectives and meet the criteria of your prospective donor/s.
- Formulate a strategy on how to approach funders.

There is a wide selection of sources to which fund seekers can appeal for support, both locally and internationally. These include but are not limited to;

- Government
- Philanthropic entities (foundations and trusts)
- Faith-based organizations
- Development agencies
- Educational institutions
- Corporate entities

The type of assistance is not confined to monetary contributions only, but can involve a variety of other forms of support. Understanding the various forms of support that are available will help you to diversify your funding streams in order to;

- Identify and tap into a wider range of funding opportunities,
- Avoid limiting yourself to one area of support, and
- spread your options widely.

A good place to start, particularly if you are a recently established NGO or fund seeker, is to create a comprehensive list, preferably in a database format. Then, prepare a strategy detailing how you will approach the funder. In preparing this strategy you should;

- Understand the broader funding environment,
- Familiarize yourself with the donor/s, and
- Prepare an appropriately tailored application.

### **The international funding scenario**

International donors want to be assured that their money is being spent for its precise purpose. Accountability is an essential pre-requisite to receiving development assistance. It is imperative that you incorporate a comprehensive system of monitoring and reporting into your proposal. This will not only demonstrate willingness on your part to be transparent, it will also serve to highlight to the donor your

professionalism - and, will go a long way towards convincing the donor that your organization is a worthwhile investment.

### **What is fundraising?**

Fund raising is the process of gathering money or other kinds of donations from individuals, groups, organizations, businesses, governments, charities, foundations, trusts and corporations. The aim of fundraising is to fulfill the needs of the non-profit sector with the resources available in other sectors. It is strategic for grant-seekers to view fundraising as a professional and mutually beneficial activity. While fundraising provides non-profits with several types of support, it also provides funders with an investment opportunity. Understanding all the elements of the fundraising process will assist your organization in the development of effective fundraising strategies.

### **More on donors and funding opportunities**

It is important to be creative in sourcing funding opportunities. Once you have identified that a particular individual or group could be a potential funder, it is up to you to convince them that their donation is necessary. This can be done by showing them what benefits their investment would have for their organization and yours.

It is also important to maintain relationships with funders once funding has been provided.

Disbursement of funds marks the start of a relationship in which you should regularly communicate with donors. In some cases, you will be required to report back according to their standard reporting requirements. Most importantly, ensure that you meet the deadlines for reporting and that all necessary documentation is provided, especially in terms of financial elements. Showing appreciation and thanks for their contribution is also very important. Acknowledge their contribution, especially in your marketing material, such as brochures, websites, pamphlets and annual reports.

### **Fundraising fundamentals**

"A successful fundraiser has a thick skin, a soft heart, exceptional hearing, a quick mind, a slow tongue and no shame." - By Robert DE Martinis.

- Look professional and act professionally.
- Speak with enthusiasm, excitement and conviction for your cause, or ask someone

who can. If you seem disinterested, the donor will be disinterested.

- Do not ask for a gift, offer them an investment opportunity. Convince them why they need to support the cause, rather than beg them for money.
- Network, network network! Attend events, speak to everybody, make friends

In addition, connections. Fundraising often starts with whom you know.

- See everyone as a donor. Donors are not only big companies with lots of money.
- Identify people who can contribute to your cause by volunteering, providing sponsorship and such.
- Develop a strategy. Identify possible donors and prepare your approach.
- Diversify! Do not risk everything on one endeavor. Approach many donors for different donations like materials and/or equipment, not only cash donations.
- Pay attention to calls for funding in the newspapers and other media platforms.
- Look and listen. Look for donors and listen to their needs and concerns. Stay educated on the development sector by accessing information from established organizations, reading relevant publications (including free material on-line) and gaining access to free government documents.

### **The basic steps to successful fundraising**

Fundraising is one of the most important activities that your organization will undertake. It determines whether or not your organization will be able to carry out valuable programs and projects in the society. Sufficient funding can ensure the future sustainability of your organization. More so, as part of your fundraising strategy, it is essential to look to income generation and resource mobilization as ways of

sustaining your future. A creative and proactive approach will ensure that you do not become dependent on only one source of income.

The following information is a guideline to some of the basics of fundraising. The limits of fundraising are defined by your imagination!

### **1. What are your organizational goals and objectives?**

It is important to know exactly what you wish to achieve. Your organization must have goals and objectives. Identify what services you currently offer and would like to offer in future. You must then identify where your funding needs are - both current and future - so that you can set realistic funding goals.

### **2. What are your funding goals and needs?**

Once you have identified what areas need funding or support, you can begin to plan your funding strategy. Remember not to expect to raise very large amounts of money. Be realistic about what you can achieve. You need to consider the following questions:

- What is your organization's income?
- Does it meet service delivery (projects and programs) and operational (staff, equipment) costs?
- Is this income continuous or will it 'dry up'?
- What programs and services need funding?

Once you have answered these questions it will be easier to see what areas need funding or other forms of support (other than cash donations) such as volunteers, donations-in-kind or sponsorship.

### **3. What is our current fundraising strategy - is it effective?**

Review and assess the successes or failures of your previous and current funding strategy.

This will enable you to identify;

- What works

- What does not work
- Possible areas for improvement
- New opportunities

### **Setting up an evaluation board and fundraising committee**

In order to successfully fundraise, you could also set up an evaluation board and a fundraising committee, so that you are constantly adjusting your fundraising strategy effectively and work in a focused manner. These two bodies can work together in the various stages of planning, conducting donor research, undertaking any public relations work and monitoring financial resources. They could be responsible for all aspects of the fundraising process from development to implementation. Ensure that those involved receive appropriate training. Your governing body (committee/trustees) should be committed and be able to assist with fundraising - as this is an ongoing and demanding process.

### **4. What is your plan of action?**

Creating an action plan is the next step after identifying your organization's goals and objectives. The action plan should be time specific, showing your fundraising strategy and the actions that must be taken to execute it.

### **5. Evaluating your successes and achievements**


The best way to fundraise successfully is to evaluate all previous funding efforts. Evaluation is not simply about how much money you raised, but measuring the effectiveness of the whole process. You need to assess what went well and, what went wrong. These are some key questions that you may want to consider in this assessment:

- Did members of the organization work together effectively?
- Did everyone carry out assigned tasks on time? If not, why not?
- Was the budget realistic and well thought through?
- How diversified is the funding? In other words, did your organization depend on one type of funding from one source, or from a range of sources?

## The ten most common reasons grants are declined

If you did not receive the funding or donation you applied for, it is very important that you ask the question **"WHY?"** Approach the donor, asking them if they can appropriate some time to explain to you why the proposal was unsuccessful and give you feedback on your application. This feedback will enable you to make the necessary changes and improve the quality of your approach.

- The organization does not meet our priorities.
- Undertake sufficient research before applying to ensure that you closely match the funding criteria for a particular organization.
- The organization is not located in our geographical area of funding. Get all qualifying guidelines for the grant before applying.
- The proposal does not follow our prescribed format.
- Read the application information very carefully and follow it exactly. Ensure that your application is complete and submitted in the required format.
- The proposal is poorly written and difficult to understand.
- Have friends and experienced people critique the grant. Obtain assistance to improve the quality of your proposal.
- The proposed budget and grant request is not within our funding range.
- Look at the average size of grants of the funder and whether your budget matches the funds that may be available for dispensing.
- We don't know these people - are they credible?
- Set up an interview before submitting the proposal and have board members and other funded organizations give you credibility. Provide written references from other funders if you can. Ensure that all supporting documentation backing your credentials are provided with your proposal. Build your credibility by ensuring that reputable members of the community serve on your Board of Trustees or as Patrons.
- The proposal doesn't seem urgent - and I'm not sure it will have an impact.

- 
- Study the priorities and have a skilled writer assist you, in order to ensure that you retain the interest of the funder. Ensure that you clearly indicate how and when your project will have an impact on the identified beneficiaries.
  - The objectives and plan of action of the project greatly exceed the budget and time lines for implementation.
  - Be sensible about the programs and budgets - only attempt to undertake a plan of action that realistically can be delivered. Give the amount requested and your available resources.
  - We've allocated all the money for this grant cycle. Do not take this personally. It is a fact of life. Undertake research into the time frames of the various grant cycles and try again.
  - There is insufficient evidence that the programmer will become self-sufficient and sustain itself after the grant is completed.
  - Add a section to the proposal on plans for sustainability and develop a long-term strategy.

### **The diversified fundraising approach**

There are many ways to fundraise other than mass mailing which is sending the same funding proposal to many donors in the mail. Mass mailing is actually an extremely unsuccessful method of fundraising, almost guaranteed to result in rejection. Donors can pick up whether or not you put the effort into understanding their values and objectives before sending them a proposal for funding.

## **KEY FUNDRAISING TIPS**

### **The value of donations-in-kind**

Donations-in-kind are gifts which are given without conditions attached to them. They are not cash transfers but rather items given to an organization to assist in service delivery. These range from office equipment, building materials, clothing, food, as well as larger donations like vehicles, venues for use in events and so forth. It should be part of your organization's fundraising strategy to identify what kinds of donations-in-kind could be used, instead of trying to find cash donations to purchase those items. For example, if there was a need for furniture, one could approach various furniture stores for donations.

Proposals that are tailor-made are usually much more successful. A diversified fundraising approach goes beyond the submission of proposals to funders. Such an approach seeks other non-monetary ways to gather resources and benefits to the organization. In a diversified fundraising approach, recognizing the

following alternative fundraising methods is key:

### **The value of the internet**

Marketing your organization through the internet is a useful form of fundraising. You reach a global audience quickly because communication with a donor is literally a click away. The internet has many useful sites on how organizations can increase their visibility online.

### **The value of marketing**

One of the best ways to market your organization is by holding fundraising events such as auctions or gala dinners. When properly organized, such events are valuable activities that can affect your organization's development in terms of the contacts made and publicity gained. The actual event will promote and publicize your organization and its cause while ticket sales from it will provide cash funds. These events are opportunities to network with key people in the sector, helping your organization to form partnerships with groups in the field. The event will also allow for the identification of possible future investors.

### **The value of the media**

The media also play a crucial role. Various television programs, newspapers and magazines as well as radio broadcasts can help to keep your organization in the public eye by providing it with a voice to communicate its cause and highlight an area or aspect that needs attention.

Exploring the various social support programs available on different television stations is a creative way to possibly expose your organization to a wider audience.

### **Some reasons why proposals are unsuccessful**

- Proposals show little evidence of research or knowledge of the donor. They are mass-mailed and are not tailored to the donor's specifications.
- Project goals and aims are not clear.
- The proposal does not follow donor guidelines.
- The proposed projects are based on insufficient evidence.
- The proposal does not convince the funder of the need for such a project or proposal.
- The overall design and layout of the proposal is not clear.
- The project is not carefully thought through.
- The people involved are not suitably qualified to carry out the project.
- There is not enough evidence of partnerships or reference to relevant people.
- The project outlined in the proposal appears to be impractical and difficult to carry out.
- The proposal is incomplete, or does not stick to the format required by the funder.

If you note these points as you research, structure and write your proposal, you will increase the chance that your proposal will be seriously considered. If you follow these guidelines and nonetheless find that your proposal is unsuccessful, it is in your best interest to ask what exactly went wrong so that you can learn from the experience and produce better proposals in the future.

## **PROPOSAL WRITING TIPS FOR GRANT SEEKERS**

### **Introduction to Proposal Writing**

A [proposal](#) is an essential marketing document that helps cultivate an initial professional relationship between an [organization](#) and a [donor](#) over a project to be implemented. The proposal outlines the plan of the implementing organization about the project, giving extensive information about the intention, for implementing it, the ways to manage it and the results to be delivered from it.

A proposal is a very important document. In some cases, a [concept note](#) precedes a proposal, briefing the basic facts of the project idea. However, the project idea faces a considerable challenge when it has to be presented in a framework. The proposal has a framework that establishes ideas formally for a clear understanding of the project for the donor. Besides, unless the ideas are not documented in writing, they do not exist. Hence, a proposal facilitates appropriate words for the conception of an idea.

Proposals have recently become more sophisticated. This reflects the increased competitiveness and larger resources existing in the [NGO](#) sector. The trend of inviting [proposals](#) for contracting development programs began with the allotment of substantial resources for development that triggered off the mushrooming of [NGOs](#) around the world.

Enormous [opportunities](#) existing in the sector have led to the trend of making proposal writing a profession. Proposal writing poses many challenges especially for small and unskilled NGOs.

### **Problems in Writing Proposals**

Before we start learning about [proposal](#) writing, it will serve our purpose if we outline the exact difficulties we face working on the proposal.

The following are the common problems we face while trying to write a proposal:

#### **1. Confused about the format?**

There are as many proposal formats as there are a number of donors and each [donor](#) as a different format. Although the basic information requested by various donors is generally the same, we often encounter snags that make the entire process confusing.

#### **2. Planning problems?**

Although a good idea exists but when we try to plan it out extensively, we face many unexpected challenges.

#### **3. Fear of proposal rejections?**

No matter how much of an expert we are in writing [proposals](#), the underlying fear of proposal rejection hovers over us while writing it.

#### **4. Tight deadlines?**

This is perhaps the universal problem for all proposal writers. For some reason or the other, we are expected to complete working proposals under very tight deadlines.

#### **5. Solicited and unsolicited proposal?**

Solicited and unsolicited proposals are quite confusing. Many [NGOs](#) work hard and submit proposals to donors, but soon they get a letter stating that they had never asked them to send.

Before we start writing a [proposal](#), it is important for us to do some [research](#). No matter how small or big the project is some kind of references to existing literature or data should be made. Usually, it is expected that the [NGO](#) has enough information at hand about the problem or the project before writing the proposal. Yet, [NGOs](#) have to gather all related information about the issue they are working on and then sit down to write the proposal.

In some cases, donors sponsor pre-proposal research so that [organizations](#) have enough evidence, both at field and in literature, before developing the actual proposal. However, not many NGOs are lucky enough to avail such an [opportunity](#).

While planning the proposal, it is ideally believed that all stakeholders have been consulted or involved in the process. There are generally three main categories of stakeholders involved in the process of writing the proposal. They are:

##### **I. The Proposing Organization/s or the Proponent**

This could be just one NGO or a group of NGOs applying for the project to the [donor](#).

##### **II. The Community**

The most important stakeholder for whom the project is conceived. Community members, beneficiaries, or the target group has to be involved in the proposal planning process so that the project reflects strong qualities of participation and community ownership.

##### **III. The Donor Agency**

Whenever possible, it will be useful to take inputs from the donor. In formal invitations for [proposals](#), the donor may discourage any contact with the proposing organizations. However, in other situations where donor has requested for a one-to-one proposal, it will be a good idea to have several meetings

with this stakeholder and note down information carefully. It will also help researching donor priorities while conceiving the proposal idea.

**Make sure you gather enough information about your donor, such as,**

- Aid priorities and issues of the donor
- The donor's country strategy paper (if any)
- Proposal Guidelines
- Previously funded projects and programs

#### **6. Writing about Ourselves: The Organization**

- New individuals working on [proposals](#) in a particular [NGO](#) may face problems in writing about organizational background. They prefer to just copy previous information into this particular section of the [proposal](#). However, this information may be sometimes out dated. You may have forgotten to add an important NGO activity.
- Besides, many times, there are facts about our [organizations](#), which we ourselves are unaware of. We do quite a lot of [research](#) on the beneficiaries and the [donor](#) agency while writing the proposal, but we hardly see the necessity of researching our own [organization](#) to present the best picture of our institution to the donor.
- To ensure that there is thorough knowledge about the organization in the proposal, it is important to not only copy information from previous documents, but also carry out discussions with colleagues about the project.
- The SWOT tool comes handy here when we sit with our colleagues and find out the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats of the organization. Once this framework is ready, it will be quite easy for us to write the proposal and answer the sharp questions of any proposal format.

### **The Actual Proposal**

A general format of the [proposal](#) consists of the following parts:

1. Problem Statement
2. Rationale or Justification for implementing the Project
3. Project Goal & Objectives
4. Strategy & Activities
5. Results: Outputs and Outcomes
6. Budget

This basic format of a proposal has expanded covering many concepts and issues, confronting project [funding](#) and project implementation.

As donors in project implementation and funding processes gather new experiences, new explanations are sought from the applicant through the proposal.

### **Writing Problem Statement/Project Rationale in a Proposal**

The Problem Statement/Project Rationale gives an explanation about the issue that is being addressed by the project. It also argues in favor of implementing the project in the proposed area in the existing conditions. It is very critical that we give evidence to what we are writing in this section of the [proposal](#). Evidence can be in form of other [research](#), existing literature or data collected by the [organization](#) itself. The following are some important points that need to be remembered while developing the Problem

#### **Statement/Project Rationale:**

Problem Statement/Project Rationale is a brief analysis or summary of the problems identified relating to the project or issue to be addressed by the project.

It has to be precise and point-to-point basis.

Use of quotes, live examples, references, research data and press articles would be very helpful.

It has to be very specific to [donor](#) issues and priorities.

Giving references to other [NGOs](#), Governmental work in the area working against the same problem would be useful.

Some common information we use in this section includes:

- Country, region, area details (location in region, government, population etc.);
- Poverty information, including information on the state of the economy,
- Employment/unemployment;
- Gender issues;
- [HIV](#)/AIDS situation;
- Health and [education](#)

### **Project Goal**

A project goal is a very general, high-level and long-term objective of the project. It is different from project objectives because the latter are very specific and have to be addressed alone by the project. However, a goal cannot be achieved by the project on its own since there will be other forces like the Government and other agencies as well working to achieve it. It is a major benchmark to compare work between different projects. Usually there is one project goal only and it can be reflected in the title of the project. It should ideally support the overall policy of the government or the [donor](#) agency.

### **Example:**

- “Providing housing facilities to earthquake-affected victims” – This cannot be a project goal, but can be a general objective
- “Reducing the impact of natural [disaster](#) over communities belonging to the hilly region” – This can be a project goal, as you are contributing to the problem in addition to other efforts.

### **Writing Project Objectives**

Project Objectives should be:

**SMART: Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant and Time-bound.**

Project objectives are the specific objectives for which the project works to achieve them within a stipulated time. They should directly address the problem mentioned in the Problem Statement. They should be specific: the more specific it is the better to design activities, indicators and the Logical

Framework Analysis. Specific objectives also help address the problem stated and convince the [donor](#) easily.

**Tips:**

- Think about what success means for your project and how you would show that success
- Refer to the results you expect from the project
- Describe the focus population and the desired change among the population
- Include the location and time period for each objective
- Reflect the intended changes in systemic conditions or behaviors that must be achieved to accomplish the goal/strategic objective
- Objectives should have measurable indicators which show what, when, and how conditions, behaviors, and practices will change
- Objectives must be verifiable at some point during the execution of the project

A good objective can be:

“To increase the income-level of [women](#) farmers from 5% to 15% in the district.”

- Strengthen...
- Improve...
- Enhance...

Some Inappropriate words not to be used while writing Objectives

- Train
- Provide
- Produce
- Establish

- Create

### Strategies and Activities

Proposals are required to outline how the objectives of the project would be achieved. Here, it will be necessary to mention the strategies and the activities to be implemented in the project. There is lot of difference between strategies and activities. Strategies are broad concepts under which activities are placed.

Strategies in a project can include:

- Capacity-building/ awareness raising
- Organizational development
- Research & Development
- Advocacy
- Victim Support Strategy
- Micro-finance and CBO development Strategy
- Participatory Infrastructure Development Strategy

Activities can include:

- Training workshops, street shows, rallies
- Staff selection, staff training
- Baseline, PRA, FGD
- Conferences, meetings, articles, publications
- Establishing shelter homes, counseling, legal support
- Forming SHGs and [cooperatives](#)
- Building irrigation tanks, demo plots etc.

To develop activities:

- Refer back to the lessons learned from previous projects.
- Identify best practices from other agencies/ projects/sources.

- Activities as identified by the communities
- Develop activities by listing numbers, so that they can be referred back easily
- Leave space for unplanned activities that can be added later during project implementation

Activities are usually listed out in a Gantt chart. A Gantt Chart is a kind of a timetable of all project activities given along with the role and responsibilities of the project staff.

## **Performance Indicators and Risks & Assumptions**

### **Performance Indicators**

A Performance Indicator is a measure of the result. It gives a sense of what has been or what is to be achieved. For example, the number of households that keep their surroundings clean and hygienic or the number of [women](#) participating in [training](#) programs.

There are two types of indicators, namely, “Process Indicators” and “Results Indicators.” Process indicators define the indicators for a process or an activity like ‘number of women participating in the training on gender development’ and Results Indicators refer to the indicators that indicate the result achieved from the implementing the activity like ‘number of women aware about gender rights.’

### **Risks & Assumptions**

Risks and Assumptions are part of the concept based on the principle that we have less and less control of the project results as we go down and down implementing the project.

For example, ‘Government policies/ officials are supportive of the project activities’ or ‘ongoing [peace](#) and stability may get hampered by sporadic violence.’ Results are changes that we expect to take place after implementing the project activities. The results are generally positive experiences undergone by the beneficiaries.

### **Results are divided into three types:**

1. Outputs
2. Outcomes
3. Impact

Outputs are immediate results that we achieve soon after the completion the project or any specific project activity. For example, if a [training](#) on [human rights](#) is carried out in a project, the output or the immediate result of it is “a greater understanding of human rights amongst the participants.”

The outcomes are results that have been or that are to be achieved after a period, but not immediate. In the above example, it could be that “the participants have gone further to communities to inform them about human rights or carrying out policy [advocacy](#) in favor of human rights.”

The impact is the longer-term result that has happened because of the activities undertaken in the project. The impact in the example given above could be “policies are framed by the Government to protect the human rights of the people.”

### **Monitoring & Evaluation**

Although it is the responsibility of the [donor](#) to carry out monitoring and evaluation of the project, it usually seeks the plan from the implementing [NGO](#) about it.

Monitoring and evaluation enables constant check on the activities and helps review the progress made at every step. Monitoring should be the integral part of project implementation; in fact, there should be an internal mechanism to monitor the results, risks, assumptions and performance regularly through meetings and submission reports. The Management Information Systems (MIS) is often used as a mechanism to undertake monitoring. The baseline information is critical to the monitoring process.

Involving external entities such as donors, government people, consultants etc. in monitoring would give a good [opportunity](#) to collect feedback, provide exposure to the work and explore new options. Evaluation is carried out by an external agency during the mid-term or in the end part of the project.

### **Budget and Proposal Packaging**

The budget has to be itemized as clearly as possible, presented in the required format. It should be in line with the activities set in the project. It will be an additional advantage to mention contribution from other sources such as the community or other donors. Contribution made by the proposing [organization](#) should also be mentioned. If there is any recurring income from the project activities, it needs to be clearly given in the budget section.

### **Proposal Packaging**

When the [proposal](#) writing is complete, it is important to ensure that the packaging has been done properly before submitting it to the [donor](#). Below are some important points to be kept in mind while packaging the proposal.

- The Title Page should have Project title, name of the donor agency and name, logo & contact info of the [NGO](#).
- there should be a Table of Contents
- there should be one page for explaining acronyms
- There should be a Project Summary- not more than one page, narrating goal, objectives, results and activities.
- An Organizational overview
- Ensure that page numbering, header & footer are complete.
- While writing, use active sentences more.
- Keep in mind the limit for the total no. of pages for the proposal.
- Attach appendices, if necessary give Bibliography and references.
- The proposal should be signed and sealed.
- Covering letter is essential







The California Air Resources Board approved \$700,000 in grants for demonstration projects to evaluate clean air technology.

Advanced Transit Dynamics, Eaton and the Sacramento Municipal Utility District will each receive over \$200,000 for projects.

Eaton will build a package delivery van using a hydraulic series hybrid system it has developed.

Similar systems have also been developed and tested by several other companies. UPS has been running several series hybrid vans for more than two years.

Advanced Transit Dynamics will show an active aerodynamic system installed on a class 8 tractor-trailer designed to minimize drag.

The Sacramento project will use digester gases to consume some of the emissions from a stationary engine fueled by biogas.

Companies getting the grants must provide matching funds for at least half the cost of the project with at least 10 percent coming from the grant recipient.

It works also as a center for information and dissemination of this initiative, and as an observatory of intercultural dialogue in the region. The foundation coordinates a Euro-Mediterranean network that gathers hundreds of social and institutional bodies that share the values of the foundation and work to make dialogue, peace, and prosperity possible in the region.

#### **75. Anna Lindh Grant-Making**

One way in which the Anna Lindh Foundation fulfills its mission is by providing grants to civil society organizations through an annual call for proposals to select the best initiatives for intercultural dialogue. The Anna Lindh Foundation works in six main program areas: ideas and ideologies;

#### **Mapping Youth Funding in Different Regions of the World**

Education; cultural protection, media; religion, spirituality, and values; and cities and diversity. The call is focused on thematic issues in line with each year's priorities. Between 2006 and 2008, the foundation gave over 280 grants, financed activities and projects in over 30 countries, and mobilized over 2,000 partners and institutions in the region.

#### **76. AFRICAN DEVELOPMENT BANK (AFDB) AND THE AFRICAN DEVELOPMENT FUND (ADF)**

The AfDB is a multilateral development bank whose shareholders include 53 African countries and 24 non-African countries from the Americas, Asia, and Europe. It was established in 1964 and officially began operations in 1967. The group's primary objective is to promote sustainable economic growth in order to reduce poverty in Africa. It achieves this objective by financing a broad range of development projects and programs in five topical areas, including poverty reduction and regional integration, and with many projects that have young people as their primary beneficiaries. During its 40 years of operations, AfDB has disbursed over 3,000 loans and grants totaling over US\$50 billion.

As a more specific instrument, AfDB launched the ADF in 1974. ADF's objective is the promotion of economic and social development in 38 least-developed African countries by providing concessional funding for projects and programs, as well as technical assistance for studies and capacity-building activities. In 2008, US\$3.1 billion were disbursed to projects in areas including

Infrastructure development, environment, agriculture and rural development, and social services. Among the latter, education represents an important target of ADF funding, and projects supported recently included:

**The African Virtual University:** This project contributes to human resources development by strengthening the institutional capacity of a network of institutions coordinated by the African Virtual University to deliver and manage quality Information-and-Communication-Technology-assisted education and training opportunities in the region. ADF funding: US\$9.3 million.

**Alternative Learning and Skills Development Project, Tanzania:** This project contributes to human resources development by providing access to alternative learning, skills, and employment opportunities to out-of-school youth. ADF funding: US\$12.2 million.

**Post-primary Education and Training Project, Uganda:** Over a period of five years, the project will improve and expand school facilities, as well as their management and teaching quality. This project will include environmental improvements in the schools through rehabilitation, and expansion of learning and accommodation spaces, sanitation, water supply and landscaping, and training on school facilities maintenance. A total of 100,000 additional pupils will gain access to education. ADF funding: US\$96.6 million.

**Support to Education in Zambia:** The project contributes to increased access to, equity, and quality of basic education of children in Zambia. These goals are being met by constructing 188 classrooms at 42 rural schools, providing teaching materials for 65,000 pupils, and training 500 teacher-trainers and 10,000 teachers over a period of four years. ADF funding: US\$15.8 million.

**Support to Education Sector Development, Eritrea:** The project supports improved access to elementary-level education by constructing additional classrooms in existing schools located in underserved areas. The project will also construct and furnish two hostels to ensure continuity of education up to the middle school level for highly disadvantaged girls. In-service training, distance education, instruction materials and equipment, and teacher training

Scholarships will be provided to ensure a sufficient number of qualified teachers. ADF funding: US\$34.6 million.

**Support to the Strategic Action Plan for Vocational Education and Training, Tanzania:** By establishing regional training centers, this project provides access to vocational training to young people in peripheral rural areas. The new facilities not only benefit the education of rural youth but also enhance regional development and quality of life for inhabitants more broadly. ADF funding: US\$29.4 million.

### **78. AFRICAN UNION (AU)**

Founded in 1964, the AU is the continent's principal organization for the promotion of accelerated socioeconomic integration, with the aim of creating greater unity and solidarity among African countries and peoples. It focuses on the promotion of peace, security, and stability on the continent as a prerequisite for the implementation of the development and integration agenda of the Union. Given their demographic importance, the AU sees young people as a key vehicle for implementing its objectives of peace, unity, and prosperity.

In this pursuit, a key vehicle was launched in 2005 with the Economic, Social and Cultural Council of the AU. The Council marks a new course for the AU as it responds to calls for democracy and development

from Africa's vibrant civil society institutions. The rich and diverse human and institutional resources at the grassroots level in Africa are to become part of new partnerships between the governments and all segments of the society. One of the key functions of the Council is to "forge strong partnerships between governments and all segments of the civil society, in particular women, the youth, children, the Diaspora, organized labor, the private sector, and professional groups." The Council

Formed a number of sectorial cluster committees, including several that are of particular relevance for young people: peace and security; social affairs and health; human resources, science, and technology; and women and gender.

#### **79. AUSTRALIAN AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (AUSAID)**

AusAID is the government agency responsible for managing Australia's overseas aid program. The objective of the aid program, whose budget is AUD\$3.8 billion in 2009–10, is to help developing countries reduce poverty and achieve sustainable development. Australia's aid program focuses on the Asia Pacific region, but also provides selective assistance to Africa and the Middle East.

**Education:** AusAID has two priorities in the area of education. First, its programs improve the functioning of national education systems to enable more girls and boys to complete primary school and progress to higher levels of education. Second, its programs enhance the relevance and quality of education, including vocational and technical education, so students acquire the knowledge and skills necessary for life and productive employment. The aim is, by 2010, to help developing countries increase the number of children attending school by ten million and to improve the quality of education for an additional 50 million children. One of the flagship projects of AusAID is the Australia-Pacific Technical College, which focuses on increasing the number of skilled Pacific island graduates and enhancing the quality of their training to meet Australian standards of vocational and technical education. If this is done well, in the right sectors, Pacific island economies will benefit from a larger, better skilled workforce to support economic growth, and graduates will benefit from improved employment opportunities at home and in an increasingly international labor market

**Health:** Children and young people are, along with women, the primary focus groups of AusAID's programming on primary health care and disease prevention. In the Asia-Pacific region, women's and children's health, domestic violence, HIV/AIDS, and malaria are serious challenges, compounded by insufficient public health systems, national health policy development and planning, disease surveillance

systems, and health education. AusAID support is provided to address public health deficits directly and build more effective public health structures.

An example of the strong focus on children and young people that characterizes many of AusAID's health programming is the Wan Smolbag Theater. From a small group of voluntary actors in 1989, the theater is now one of the Pacific's premier drama companies and produces plays about social and environmental issues important to Vanuatu. With nearly half the country's population under the age of 29, young people dominate the audience, and Wan Smolbag Theater provides them with lively and entertaining educational material. Performed by people more or less the same age as the audience, the plays contain strong social messages that stimulate helpful discussions and encourage healthier attitudes.

**Human Rights:** One of the pillars of AusAID's assistance is the Human Rights Small Grants Scheme, established in 1997 to fund projects that build the capacity of developing countries to promote and protect human rights. Projects focus on educating and raising awareness in the area of human rights, promoting democratic principles, educating and training human rights workers, promoting international human rights standards, improving reporting to UN treaty bodies and the Universal Periodic Review, and promoting and strengthening national or regional human rights institutions or policies. Funded projects directly benefit marginalized groups (such as people with disabilities, women, children, and youth, people living with HIV/AIDS, prisoners, homeless people, refugees and internally displaced people, indigenous peoples, ethnic minorities, and others), and promote equal opportunities for women and men. Grants range from AUD\$20,000 to 100,000 over one year, and can benefit projects in Latin America, the Caribbean, Africa, the Middle East, Asia, and the Pacific.

**Research:** AusAID funds practical, policy-relevant social science research into development challenges through its Australian Development Research Awards. Annual calls for proposals invite research projects from Australian and international research organizations and institutions within specific priority areas. In 2009, these areas include disability-inclusive development, economics, gender, and performance-linked aid. Proposals for projects that last up to three years are accepted and eligible to receive funding between AUD\$100,000 and \$300,000 per year. Although not specifically focused on youth research, projects with a focus on children and young people are eligible.

ASEAN was established in 1967 in Bangkok by Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, and Thailand, later joined by Brunei, Vietnam, Laos, Myanmar, and Cambodia. It aims to accelerate economic growth, social progress, and cultural development and to promote regional peace and stability through abiding respect for justice and the rule of law in the relationship among countries in the region and adherence to the principles of the United Nations Charter.

ASEAN has an elaborate framework of cooperation mechanisms for youth policy development and involvement of young people in the development of the region. Overseen by an ASEAN ministerial meeting on youth that convenes. Once every two years, the Work Program directs youth cooperation on Preparing ASEAN Youth for Sustainable Development. The Work Program serves as the major channel for pursuing ASEAN cooperation in youth development, and outlines the following four priority areas: policy development; promoting ASEAN awareness and civic responsibility; promoting employability of youth; and information exchange and partnership. Numerous activities are conducted to implement the Work Program, including:

- Annual ASEAN Youth Day Meetings and ASEAN Youth Day Awards;
- An ASEAN Youth Leadership Development Program to promote the concept of youth leadership, policy formulation, and youth volunteers;
- A Regional Capacity-Building Workshop to Promote Youth-Initiated Enterprises for government officials and young entrepreneurs to promote youth entrepreneurship;
- A regional Youth Caucus that provides opportunities for youth representatives to present their discussions to the ministerial level on themes such as education, environment, employment and entrepreneurship, and community engagement.

- address one of the fields of science and technology, environment, culture and information, social development (youth, women, health and nutrition, education, labor affairs, disaster management, HIV/AIDS prevention and control, children, population, and rural development and poverty eradication), drug matters, or civil service;
- address a regional issue and benefit all ASEAN member countries;
- be sustainable, co-financed from other sources of funding, and achievable within a specified period of time;
- benefit people at the grassroots level directly.

At present, the combined funding from these donors totals US\$4.3 million, of which the foundation supports its grant-making, operational programs, and the building of its endowment.

AYA was launched in 2000 as a five-year initiative funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation through the United States Committee for UNFPA. A partnership of UNFPA, the Program for Appropriate Technology in Health), and Pathfinder International, the program worked to improve, scale up, and institutionalize HIV/AIDS prevention and adolescent reproductive health programs in Botswana,

Ghana, Tanzania, and Uganda. Through AYA, young people were educated about HIV/AIDS prevention and provided with necessary information, skills, and support to protect their health.

Between 2000 and 2005, and with a budget of US\$56.7 million, the program reached over 35 million stakeholders through media campaigns. Almost 400,000 young people received life-planning skills training, and young people made over 2.5 million visits to clinics and outreach services.



British Council's International Climate Champions is a program that works in 60 countries across the globe, with young people who are passionate and committed to action on climate change. The British Council provides them with training and support to develop and implement projects within their local communities that raise awareness of climate change, limit the impact of climate change (adaptation), and reduce carbon footprint (mitigation). International Climate Champions spend a year working with their local communities carrying out projects that raise awareness of climate change and crucially encourage people to change their behavior. As well as working in their local area, International Climate Champions meet with local and national leaders to share their experiences. Some champions have the chance to express their views to world leaders at international meetings, such as the UN Conference on Climate Change in Copenhagen in December 2009. Champions vary in age in different countries but are between 11 and 35 years. During 2009, the British Council was working with champions in 60 countries across the globe, and membership of the network grew to more than 2000.

- **Persistence.** Exhibiting Dr. Borlaug’s “never give up” attitude, even in the face of adversity, difficult circumstances, limitation of resources, and/or critique from colleagues.
- **Innovation.** Applying Dr. Borlaug’s credo “reach for the stars” in pursuing innovative pathways, methods, and solutions in a quest to provide adequate food and nutrition for the world’s people.

- **Communication.** Emulating Dr. Borlaug's example of understanding local cultures; working effectively in cross-cultural, cross-disciplinary situations; identifying the needs and assets of people in a given community or region; and connecting with a diverse array of stakeholders.
  - **Research/Science.** Facilitating positive change through rigorous research methods, techniques, management approaches, and/or strategies that result in increased food production, availability, distribution, and/or better nutrition.
  - **Extension.** Extending innovative discoveries and technologies in plant science, animal science, and/or food science to underserved farmers and consumers.
  - **Education.** Providing hands-on science training and education to stakeholders in rural communities, including farm families and agricultural and food production workers.
  - **Application.** Applying improved technologies and/or management systems to crops and/or animal agriculture for sustainable production, more nutritious food, and a reduction of poverty.
  - **Leadership.** Demonstrating leadership of other agricultural professionals, field researchers, and/or practitioners working in collaborative programs aimed at reducing hunger and poverty and revitalizing communities.
  - **Impact.** Increasing the amount of food available through all of the above. Dr. Borlaug was always about making a difference and "putting more food on the plate."

**Nominee Eligibility:**

- Nominees must be under the age of 40 (40th birthday not reached before World Food Day, October 16, of the year in which the award is presented).
- Nominees must be actively working in the discipline, research area, position, or on the project(s) for which they are being recognized. They may be associated with a public or private educational, research or development organization or related entity.

#### 148. CANADA PRIMATE'S WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND OF THE ANGLICAN CHURCH OF CANADA

The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund came into existence because of a terrible human tragedy in Canadian history. In 1958, in Springhill, Nova Scotia, there was an underground explosion in a coal mine, 174 men were in the mine when it collapsed, and 75 died because of the disaster. The tragedy moved Anglicans and other Canadians to respond with assistance for the stricken families. Because of this experience, the church recognized the need for an efficient process to channel assistance quickly in situations of emergency.

In 1959, the General Synod established The Primate's World Relief Fund. In 1969, the name of the organization was officially changed to The Primate's World Relief *and Development* Fund, which reflected the agency, its maturing program focus and philosophy. PWRDF came to see that much deeper, long-term development needs were strongly connected to most of the suffering caused by natural or human-provoked disasters. Even more significantly, PWRDF realized that people who experienced these problems first-hand were in the best position to develop long-term solutions.

The newly renamed Primate's World Relief and Development Fund moved in the 1970s with a commitment to addressing long-term development needs and to working in partnership with local communities and organizations. During this decade, PWRDF also became more active in public engagement. The Fund recognized the need to engage Canadians in the issues of tackling injustice. The General Synod gave PWRDF the responsibility of coordinating a development education program for the whole Church in order to close the gap between donors and recipients.

In the 1980s, PWRDF became very active in working with refugees and in 1984; the Refugee Subcommittee and the Refugee Coordinators Network were both established. PWRDF has built a strong program for the support and advocacy of uprooted peoples, including refugees, internally displaced populations and migrant workers, internationally through relief and development programs, advocacy, and monitoring of human rights, and in Canada through networking, and education.

PWRDF has continued to grow and build a strong programs and global partnerships. In 1999, PWRDF mandated a national Youth Initiative to engage young Canadians on social justice issues.

In the year 2000, with support from The Anglican Church of Canada, PWRDF became a separately incorporated agency with recognition and approval of the Canadian federal government under the

title: The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund/ Le fonds du Primat pour le secours et le développement mondial". PWRDF's guiding principle is to listen and learn from partners in its development work. It remains a Christian organization, committed to a vision of international development and global justice that is founded on theological reflection and a faith-based analysis.

The [Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species of Wild Animals](#) (CMS) is an inter-governmental treaty that aims to conserve terrestrial, aquatic, and avian migratory species throughout their range on a global scale. The Convention's Secretariat is provided by the United Nations Environment Program at the UN's offices in Bonn, Germany. The Convention is sometimes referred to as the Bonn Convention on Migratory Species. The participating range states work towards species conservation through global and regional legal agreements, and through less formal memoranda of understanding, varying case by case.

Grant Programs for Agriculture, Energy, Environment, Natural Resources

The CMS includes a small grants program to strengthen implementation of the Convention, and it makes a thesis award for outstanding research on migratory species.

**1 — Small Grants Program.** The CMS makes grants for field conservation; regional and national cooperation; capacity building; and awareness building in support of migratory species needing protection.

The program is open to applicants in countries that have ratified the Convention, that are below 0.200 in the UN Scale of Assessment, and that are not more than three years in arrears with their contributions.

Governmental institutions, NGOs, communities, conservationists, and researchers can submit applications.

**2 — Thesis Award.** The CMS offers this award to promote scientific research and conservation of migratory species. The thesis should provide new data and insights into the biology and ecology of migratory species, or into external factors disrupting their migration patterns. Research results should have conservation applications for the benefit of migratory species.



The Chrest Foundation is a private foundation based in Irving, Texas in the United States. However, haphazard implementation of these conventions and the lack of knowledge concerning the adopted laws and international human rights standards continue to be major obstacles when it comes to improving the overall human rights situation in the region. Political instability, widespread corruption, lack of continuity in reforms, limited independence of the judiciary and weak non-judicial mechanisms leave much work to do for human rights organizations and independent media – often the sole watchdogs in their respective societies. **230. CANADA PRIMATE'S WORLD RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT FUND OF THE

The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund came into existence because of a terrible human tragedy in Canadian history. In 1958, in Springhill, Nova Scotia, there was an underground explosion in a coal mine, 174 men were in the mine when it collapsed, and 75 died because of the disaster. The tragedy moved Anglicans and other Canadians to respond with assistance for the stricken families. Because of this experience, the church recognized the need for an efficient process to channel assistance quickly in situations of emergency.

In 1959, the General Synod established The Primate's World Relief Fund. In 1969, the name of the organization was officially changed to The Primate's World Relief *and Development* Fund, which reflected the agency, its maturing program focus and philosophy. PWRDF came to see that much deeper, long-term development needs were strongly connected to most of the suffering caused by natural or human-provoked disasters. Even more significantly, PWRDF realized that people who experienced these problems first-hand were in the best position to develop long-term solutions.

The newly renamed Primate's World Relief and Development Fund moved in the 1970s with a commitment to addressing long-term development needs and to working in partnership with local communities and organizations. During this decade, PWRDF also became more active in public engagement. The Fund recognized the need to engage Canadians in the issues of tackling injustice. The General Synod gave PWRDF the responsibility of coordinating a development education program for the whole Church in order to close the gap between donors and recipients.

In the 1980s, PWRDF became very active in working with refugees and in 1984; the Refugee Subcommittee and the Refugee Coordinators Network were both established. PWRDF has built a strong program for the support and advocacy of uprooted peoples, including refugees, internally displaced populations and migrant workers, internationally through relief and development programs, advocacy, and monitoring of human rights, and in Canada through networking, and education.


PWRDF has continued to grow and build a strong programs and global partnerships. In 1999, PWRDF mandated a national Youth Initiative to engage young Canadians on social justice issues.

In the year 2000, with support from The Anglican Church of Canada, PWRDF became a separately incorporated agency with recognition and approval of the Canadian federal government under the title: The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund/ "Le fonds du Primat pour le secours et le développement mondial". PWRDF's guiding principle is to listen and learn from partners in its

development work. It remains a Christian organization, committed to a vision of international development and global justice that is founded on theological reflection and a faith-based analysis.

By sharing the risk, the COSME guarantees will allow financial intermediaries to expand the range of SMEs and types of financial transactions they can support. The impact is substantial - due to the advantage effect, every euro invested in a loan guarantee is expected to release up to 30 euros of financing for SMEs. These guarantees will help many SMEs who might otherwise not be able to obtain funding due to their perceived higher risk or a lack of sufficient collateral.

The programme focused on sponsoring UK university students to collect data on biological diversity overseas during their summer break. Over time, the programme has evolved to address changing conservation needs, and has become an international capacity-building programme supporting young conservationists, the majority of whom are working in their own countries, to undertake applied biodiversity projects in less developed countries. Areas of support: CLP provides Conservation Awards on an annual basis to support the work of early career conservationists. There are three grant levels to allow teams to scale up their initial projects. Starting with a Future Conservationist Award, teams are supported to undertake small-scale research and awareness-raising projects. The Conservation Leadership Award is available to CLP project teams that have received both Future Conservationist Awards and Conservation Follow-Up awards. Grants are up to \$40,000, with coaching support, to undertake complex conservation projects that connect previous work and typically focus on creating enduring systems to ensure conservation outcomes in the long-term, for example creating a new, self-supporting NGO. Applications for Leadership Awards will only be considered once a full final report, financial report and evaluation form have been submitted for the CLP Follow-up project. Supporting committed teams of CLP alumni in memory of Kate Stokes In Kate's memory, her family, friends and colleagues established the Kate Stokes Memorial Trust. Through this trust, an additional \$5,000 grant is awarded on an annual basis to an exceptional team, which has previously received CLP funding. CLP alumni will be sent the call for proposals each year. There is particular emphasis on teams that demonstrate strong passion, enthusiasm and a long-term commitment to conservation.

CYP Asia is based at a regional center in Chandigarh, India. The Asia Center responds to youth development for eight countries of the Commonwealth. Similar to other regional centers, it does so with a focus on three strategic program areas:

- Youth enterprise and sustainable livelihoods;
- Governance, development, and youth networks;

- Youth work, education, and training.

A considerable part of CYP Asia's work addresses young people and HIV/AIDS. In January 2001, the Asian Youth Ambassadors for Positive Living (YAPL) program was launched and the Asia Center started work to raise awareness of AIDS and other effects of high-risk behavior in Asia. This program was initially developed by the CYP Africa Center using the services of young people living with HIV/AIDS to create awareness on issues, such as HIV/AIDS and drug abuse that affect the lives of other young people.

## **278. THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE (COE)**

The CoE wants to encourage young people to get actively involved in strengthening civil society in Europe; to defend the values of human rights, cultural diversity, and social cohesion; and to promote and develop youth policies. Its work in the field of youth involves all members of the European Council.

Currently, 48 countries in 2009. That year the CoE had approximately 2,238 staff members in five operational centers: the Directorate of Youth and Sport in Strasbourg (headquarters), Brussels, Budapest, Graz, and Lisbon. The CoE's operational programs for youth. The CoE's grant making in the field of youth is organized through its main funding mechanism called the European Youth Foundation. The following are departments or functional units of the CoE with some form of responsibility for youth:

### **The Solidarity Fund for Youth Mobility (SFYM)**

The CoE and the International Union of Railways (UIC) joined forces in 1994 to set up SFYM, which supports the mobility of disadvantaged young people. For every InterRail Card sold, €1 is donated by the UIC to fund projects involving Europe's least advantaged young people. The fund provides financial support to cover the rail travel costs of young people from underprivileged backgrounds or economically underdeveloped areas so that they can take part in international educational activities. To qualify for assistance, projects must involve at least two countries and a minimum of ten people.

**MODUS OPERANDI:** Applications to both the European Youth Foundation and the SFYM are managed centrally from the offices of the EYF at the European Youth Center in Strasbourg. For the EYF, there are two deadlines per year for activities taking place in the first and second halves of the following year. For the Solidarity Fund, applications either can be made on a rolling basis, before or after the activity has taken place. Applications can be made and tracked online. EYF staff provides, to the extent possible,

consultancy and advice to applicants and, for the purposes of monitoring and evaluation, project visits are occasionally conducted.

**Operational Programs for Youth:** In addition, the CoE has several important operational programs supporting young people, youth organizations, and the development of the youth sector, focusing on non-formal education and training, and working through youth organizations and multipliers (voluntary youth leaders, youth workers, etc.) to reach a large number of young people. These programs are organized centrally, using in-house educational staff and the institution's own residential centers, called European Youth Centers.

The CYP Africa center is located in Lusaka, Zambia, and is one of four centers established to serve the member countries of the Commonwealth. CYP Africa responds to youth development for 20 countries, including Botswana, Cameroon, Cyprus, Ghana, The Gambia, Kenya, Lesotho, Malawi, Malta, Mauritius, Mozambique, Namibia, Nigeria, Seychelles, Sierra Leone, South Africa, Swaziland, Tanzania, Uganda, and Zambia.

CYP Africa has four strategic program areas aimed at improving the condition of young people in Africa: Youth Enterprise and Sustainable Livelihoods; Governance; Development and Youth Networks; Youth Work Education and Training. Through these program areas, CYP Africa:

- provides skills, resources, and contacts for young people to create their own business ventures;
- strengthens youth governance and youth networks so that they serve young people more effectively;
- develops youth work as a profession;
- Works with governments to create value for the contributions young people make in running their countries;
- provides learning tools, models, Commonwealth experiences, and best practices in youth development across countries and regions;
- provides opportunities to use information and communication technology (ICT) to support young people and their development;
- builds youth leadership and decision making;

- Helps young people play a greater part in economic and social development;
- provides a platform for advocacy and mainstreaming youth development in the work of multilateral development agencies.

For example, CYP Africa engages in human resource development efforts through professional training courses in Youth in Development Work and delivers a CYP diploma course, as well as short courses relevant to youth development skills. The Commonwealth Diploma in Youth in Development Work is an 18-month distant education course covering various development needs of working with young people and development in general.

In addition, CYP Africa has formed a regional youth caucus, a network of young people from across Africa. One of the caucus' initiatives is its annual Innovative Projects Award that was launched in 2008. Three projects were supported in 2008 and 2009:

- increasing youth participation in policy processes and democratic governance, Cameroon;
- reducing the burden of HIV/AIDS among out-of-school youth in Kalumbu Lilongwe, Malawi;
- Interschool peace building and fighting tribalism, Kenya.

The CPLP has some programs relevant to youth in Africa, including its HIV/Aids Program, which is designed to help the five African member states and the Center for the Development of Entrepreneurial Skills that is being established in Luanda, Angola.



The EYCs in Strasbourg and Budapest are permanent structures for the implementation of the CoE's youth policy. They are international training and meeting centers with residential facilities, hosting most of the youth

Sector's activities. They provide a flexible and modern working environment for international activities, with meeting rooms equipped for simultaneous translation, information centers, and audio-visual and computer facilities. The EYC Strasbourg was founded in 1972 with financial support from the Norwegian government. It hosts the European Youth Foundation. The EYC Budapest was set up and inaugurated in 1995 as the CoE's first permanent service in a Central and East European country. The Republic of Hungary placed its premises at the disposal of the CoE. The EYCs run an annual program of up to 50 activities in close cooperation with nongovernmental youth organizations. The program of activities is co-decided upon in a system of decision making called co-management, which involves equal numbers of youth organizations and governments. The co-management system also decides on the thematic priorities, which the program addresses through its centralized activities. Both EYCs earn part of their operational income from so-called self-financed activities. These activities that pay for the use of the facilities, but must be organized by institutions or organizations subscribe through their activities to the broad mission of the CoE and to its values. The proportion of self-financing is extensive—up to one-third of income. In 2009, the total expenditure on the operation of both EYCs, including their programs within the annual budget, was €3,649,000, of which €2,906,500 is the contribution from the CoE annual budget.

EYCE is a strong network of young Christians from all over Europe who seek unity between Christians and are engaged in the work for justice, peace & the integrity of creation.

EYCE was founded in 1968, but its roots go back to just after World War II. In 1947, the World Council of Churches (WCC) began to organize annual meetings for those responsible for ecumenical youth work in the different countries of Europe. 1968 was a special year for youth and students throughout the world – these youth leaders decided to found their own organization, later known as the Ecumenical Youth Council in Europe.

EYCE’s first General Meeting was held in October 1969 in Sweden. EYCE appointed its first full-time General Secretary in 1978. Its Secretariat has since moved from East Berlin to Budapest, to Belfast and Helsinki. In 1999, a permanent office was established in Brussels.

As a Christian youth organization, EYCE strives to represent young people in Europe as much as possible. EYCE works on an entirely ecumenical basis, and therefore considers itself part of the wider ecumenical movement. It wants to encourage Churches and Christian youth movements in Europe to strive towards the unity of all Christians. Its goal is not to form one church structure, but to look for a means to work together despite of different denominational viewpoints. This means working together to overcome such obstacles as nationalism, xenophobia, social exclusion and proselytism.

Many of the above-mentioned obstacles are the result of a lack of information and the fear of the unknown. EYCE believes that bringing people together is the best way to foster mutual understanding between different Christian denominations and traditions. It tries to provide young people with a place to develop an understanding of the different expressions of faith in different denominations and countries.

In accordance with the decisions of the last EYCE General Meetings, a particular thematic focus is being put on social economic justice, inter-religious dialogue, ecumenical training and formation, human rights trainings, ecological justice, overcoming violence, HIV/AIDS, reconciliation and conflict management. In order to work on these themes, EYCE regularly organizes seminars, study sessions, training courses, workshops and other meetings. Many times, EYCE member organizations organize activities that are open for participation from other EYCE members.

EYCE also offers support by providing international ecumenical news on the EYCE website, by providing contacts and networking amongst EYCE members and partners and by raising the concerns of EYCE member organizations towards the Churches, the ecumenical movement, the European Youth Forum and the European Institutions.

### **“Making Collaboration Work” Grants for Cultural Organizations**

“Making Collaboration Work” grants stimulate collaboration between cultural organizations in projects that add value to the practice of cultural cooperation in Europe and are designed for cultural organizations. The maximum grant award is €30,000. The 2009 selection was made between March and May of that year. The ECF received 642 applications, from which 40 projects were awarded grants.





The Euro-Med Youth Program is a regional program set up within the framework of the third chapter of the Barcelona Process titled “Partnership in Social, Cultural and Human Affairs.” It promotes the mobility of young people and understanding among peoples through three types of actions: youth exchanges, voluntary services, and support measures. The current phase (III), launched in October 2005, focuses on mobility, non-formal education, and intercultural learning. Its geographical scope comprises 37 countries: the 27 EU member states and the ten Mediterranean partner countries, signatories of the Barcelona Declaration.

The decentralized implementation of the program, through Euro-Med Youth Units in participating countries, is an innovation, with the aim of bringing action as closely as possible to the beneficiaries and adapting to the diversity of national systems and situations in the field of youth. Applicants and project leaders from the Mediterranean partner countries apply directly for grants to their own national youth authorities, which are now responsible for grant awarding and the overall management of the program.

Grants are awarded for the following activities:

**Support** measures also follow the 2+2 formula (young people from two EU member states and two Mediterranean partner countries). Projects include job-shadowing, contact-making seminars, study visits, and training courses.

**Voluntary Service** consists in an unpaid, full-time, and nonprofit-making transnational voluntary activity for the benefit of the community. It involves young people from at least one EU member state and one Mediterranean partner country.

**Youth Exchange** projects bring together young people from at least four different countries (two EU member states and two Mediterranean partner countries), providing them with an opportunity to discuss various themes and learn about each other's country, culture, and language.



Erasmus for Young Entrepreneurs is a pilot project initiated by the EU. It helps new entrepreneurs acquire relevant skills for managing small or midsize enterprises (SMEs) by spending time in a business in another EU country. It contributes to improving the entrepreneur's know-how and fosters cross-border 150 **Section 2: Mapping Youth Funding in Different Regions of the World**

A transfer of knowledge and experience among entrepreneurs. The program seeks to:

- facilitate on-the-job-training for new entrepreneurs in SMEs elsewhere in the EU in order to facilitate a successful start and development of their business ideas;

- Exchange experience and information among entrepreneurs on obstacles and challenges to starting up and developing their businesses;
- enhance market access and identification of potential partners for new and established businesses in other EU countries;
- encourage networking among entrepreneurs by building on knowledge and experience from other European countries.

Erasmus for Young Entrepreneurs provides practical and financial assistance for new entrepreneurs spending time in the business of experienced host entrepreneurs in other EU countries. New entrepreneurs travel to an experienced entrepreneur in another EU country and work with him or her for one to six months. Matching new entrepreneurs with host entrepreneurs is carried out with the help of the intermediary organizations.

This program is financed by the European Commission and operates across 21 EU countries with the help of more than 100 intermediary organizations competent in business support (e.g., Chambers of Commerce, startup centers, incubators, etc.). Their activities are coordinated at European level by EUROCHAMBRES, the Association of European Chambers of Commerce and Industry, which acts as a support office.

The stay abroad must be completed within 12 months and should total between one month and six months. Within this time span the stay may be divided into a number of shorter time slots (minimum one week per slot), which the new entrepreneur spends at the host entrepreneur's business. Activities of the new entrepreneur during the stay abroad may include shadowing a senior host entrepreneur; market research and developing new business opportunities; project development, innovation, and R&D; taking a fresh look at existing business operations; understanding SME finance; branding, sales, and marketing of the host entrepreneur's company; and working on concrete projects from one or more of the above-mentioned areas.

In addition to the above, which is specifically targeted at young people, the EU's Culture, Citizenship, Lifelong Learning, Media, PROGRESS, and Competitiveness and Innovation programs, as well as its European Structural Funds can be used by different intermediary organizations and structures in the youth sector to finance their initiatives. These funds are more complicated to access than those for Youth in Action, which is specifically conceived for use by young people and their organizations and informal associations and therefore has simplified application procedures. Nevertheless, for those professional actors, their organizations, and other structures such as universities, think tanks, and professional associations within the youth sector, as well as specialized ministries in member states, these funds can provide support for large-scale, medium- to long-term initiatives with larger budgets and more ambitious objectives to improve the sector's functioning and professionalism.

**The Federal Pell Grant Program provides need-based grants to low-income undergraduate and certain post baccalaureate students to promote access to postsecondary education.** Students may use their grants at any one of approximately 5,400 participating postsecondary institutions. Grant amounts are dependent on: the student's expected family contribution (EFC) (see below); the cost of attendance (as determined by the institution); the student's enrollment status (full-time or part-time); and whether the student attends for a full academic year or less.

Students may not receive Federal Pell Grant funds from more than one school at a time.

The U.S. Department of Education using a standard formula, established by Congress, to evaluate the financial information reported on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and to determine the family EFC, determines financial need. The fundamental elements in this standard formula are the student's income (and assets if the student is independent), the parents' income and assets (if the student is dependent), the family's household size, and the number of family members (excluding parents) attending postsecondary institutions. The EFC is the sum of: (1) a percentage of net income (remaining income after subtracting allowances for basic living expenses and taxes) and (2) a percentage of net assets (assets remaining after subtracting an asset protection allowance). Different assessment rates and allowances are used for dependent students, independent students without dependents, and independent students with dependents. After filing a FAFSA, the student receives a Student Aid Report (SAR), or the institution receives an *Institutional Student Information Record (ISIR)*, which notifies the student if he or she is eligible for a Federal Pell Grant and provides the student's EFC.

Federal Pell Grants are direct grants awarded through participating institutions to students with financial need who have not received their first bachelor's degree or who are enrolled in certain post baccalaureate programs that lead to teacher certification or licensure. Participating institutions either credit the Federal Pell Grant funds to the student's school account, pay the student directly (usually by check) or combine these methods. Students must be paid at least once per term (semester, trimester, or quarter); schools that do not use formally defined terms must pay the student at least twice per academic year.







**Budget and duration of proposals:**

Budget requests should be within the range of a minimum of \$300,000 to a maximum of \$1 million total for duration of two to three years.

Proposals will be considered for a minimum \$100,000 for duration of up to three years for innovative approaches from small civil society organizations, especially grassroots women's organizations and networks, and those working in conflict and unstable situations.







The GTZ is one of the lead agencies for development cooperation in Germany. Active in 87 countries worldwide, it focuses on Africa, Asia-Pacific, Latin America, and Europe and Central Asia. The Federal Ministry of Economic Cooperation and Development of Germany, which provided US\$1.4 billion of GTZ's 2008 budget of US\$1.9 billion, primarily fund its nearly 2,700 projects.

GTZ programs focus on rural development, the economy and employment, the environment and infrastructure, good governance, social development, and crosscutting issues. Since 1997, GTZ has also developed programs that focus on children and young people in the areas of youth employment, child and youth health, risk behavior in children and adolescents, general and peace education, and crisis prevention. The objective has been to empower children

In addition, adolescents to assert their rights and play an active role in changing their situation. Programs about children and young people have three main themes:

**Protection:** Children's rights are enshrined in international law. GTZ provides support to collaborate with governments on the implementation of these rights, with a particular focus on the rights of girls. For example, since 2002, GTZ has been advising the government of Côte d'Ivoire on measures to combat child trafficking and the worst forms of child labor, combined with employment promotion measures that offer girls prospects for the future.

**Prevention:** Young people are disproportionately affected by social inequality and exclusion and therefore prone to become involved in crime, either as victims or as perpetrators. In order to tackle this challenge to societies' peace and development, GTZ utilizes a range of approaches in the areas of youth

and peace work and adolescent reproductive health care. In El Salvador, with the help of a systemic planning tool on the Prevention of Youth Violence, a component for peaceful coexistence was developed and is currently being implemented.

**Participation:** According to international conventions, young people are entitled to social and political participation. In many countries, however, these particular rights still play a subordinate role. GTZ offers its experience with youth social work and helps partner countries to implement local and national youth policies. One example of this approach to help realize children's and youth rights is in West Africa, with the aid of a tool kit titled "Get Youth on Board!" Stakeholders from Guinea, Sierra Leone, and Liberia developed strategies to promote regional collaboration on participatory youth work.

It must include a precise budget (with equivalent sum shown preferably in euros); c) a presentation of the operating NGO (status, work conducted, etc.); d) address and bank details of the NGO.

**576. HUMAN RIGHTS SMALL GRANTS SCHEME.**

The Australian Agency for International Development (AusAID) Human Rights Small Grants Scheme provides Short-term funding for Non-Government Organizations and human rights institutions in developing countries for projects that promote and protect human rights.

### **Aims of the Human Rights Small Grants Scheme**

- Providing funding for organizations based in developing countries. The small grants are awarded annually for projects that promote and protect human rights in direct and tangible ways.
- Supporting human rights by funding projects that build the capacity of developing countries to promote and protect human rights.

### **Eligible organizations:**

- Already involved in promoting and defending human rights
- Already based in an eligible developing country (Asia, the Pacific, Latin America, the Caribbean, Africa and the Middle East.
- Have a proven track record in the type of activity it wants funded and experience in the country in which the project will take place in
- Are preferably non-government, although government bodies are not excluded.

### **Eligible project activities:**

Must achieve one or more of the following objectives;

- Educating and awareness raising in the area of human rights
- Promoting democratic principles
- Educating and training human rights workers
- Promoting international human rights standards, including improved reporting to United Nations (UN) treaty bodies and the Universal Periodic Review
- Promoting and strengthening national or regional human rights institutions or policies.

Directly benefit marginalised groups (such as people with disability, women, children and youth, people living with HIV/AIDS, prisoners, homeless people, refugees and internally displaced people, Indigenous peoples, ethnic minorities and others) promote equal opportunities for women and men in line with AusAID's gender policy.

Where possible, projects should also:

- Strengthen the applicant organization's ability to deliver sustained human rights work after Australian funding has ceased
- Encourage self-help and self-reliance by involving communities in developing, implementing and managing project activities and by using community structures and systems
- Strengthen the ability of institutions to meet their obligations and requirements to report on their performance to UN human rights treaty bodies and the Universal Periodic Review.

Applications must include a strategy for identifying the project as an Australian Government-supported initiative.

Applications for joint or partial funding of a larger project with other contributors will be accepted.

Applications for funding project activities that have previously received an HRSGS grant will be considered.

New funds will not be released until previous HRSGS funding has been acquitted.

Applications must be for projects that adhere to the following Australian Government policies

**Project activities not eligible for funding:**

- Projects determined reasonably to be contrary to Australia's interests
- Projects that support independence movements
- Evangelism or missionary outreach activities
- Political campaign activities
- Projects or activities that create dependency
- Emergency relief activities
- Recurrent costs, unless the organization demonstrates in its application how it will take over these costs
- Retrospective activities
- Activities that already receive significant funding through other Australian Government programs.

**Amount and duration of funding:**

- Proposed projects should be for between a\$20,000 and a\$100,000.

- Projects should preferably be of a one-year duration.
- Projects of up to a\$150,000 over two years will be considered.
- Funding will not be provided for travel expenses exceeding 20 per cent of total project costs, or for the provision of equipment, freight or buildings, where each exceeds 20 per cent of the total project costs.

**General goals:**

Why we are committed to the freedom of speech and to those fighting for it?

It is because we know that real freedom cannot exist without the freedom of speech. Democracy feeds off free press, free arts, free literature, and photography." Yet, we also get involved due to the responsibility we feel as Germans. Each of us knows about the fate of an individual or of whole families, who during the Nazi regime were persecuted, tortured, or murdered for political, religious, or racial reasons. Until 1989, freedom was not respected in our divided country and people were intimidated for having deviant ideological beliefs. Those who raised their voices were harassed and arrested. Those who wanted to escape from the unjust state risked their lives. The personal or historical proximity to these past times prompts us to help people all over the world, who boldly raise their voices against injustice, by providing them with refuge, serenity, and a sense of security for a certain amount of time. **In addition,**

**we do that as citizens of Hamburg: Protecting the freedom of speech is part of the great Hanseatic traditions.** Not least because of this, our city is the major German media center, where resident publishing houses, agencies, and production companies are highly successful and influential.

However, this tradition also entails the obligation to stand up for those who cannot speak, write or publish freely in their home country. This is the reason why we, the Board of Directors of the Hamburg Foundation of Politically Persecuted People, are committed to all those who are denied these fundamental rights. We, who live on the safe side, must help those, who have not yet reached similarly safe ground.

**Areas of support:**

Unfortunately, countries with authoritarian or even dictatorial governments outnumber democratic states that respect freedom and the freedom of speech. However, in all unfree countries – especially in those! – There are people, who dare to advocate human rights, the freedom of speech, and the rule of law in public. This usually means danger, intimidation, and threats. It often provokes torture, imprisonment, and at worst affects their families. The Hamburg Foundation offers a few of them a safe haven for one year. Usually, it is a matter of life and death. Here in Hamburg, they are adequately taken care of and accommodated in the comfort and privacy of their own home. Here, they can work in peace: read and write journalistic articles and books, paint and take photographs. Often, they bring their families, partners, and children who attend school here. They become a part of our society. Following their one-year stay in Hamburg, the Foundation's guests return to their home countries. However, out of sight does not mean out of mind: The connections with former guests continue through transnational co-operations, intercultural exchange of information, or personal contact between friends. The Foundation's guests are important fighters and disseminators for the democratization of their home countries. To save their lives, to support their work, to provide them with space and time as well as recognition for their political commitment – this is the Foundation's principal mission. If we succeed in making them feel comfortable, in giving them some freedom and the opportunity to finish a significant piece of work, it will ultimately resonate with their compatriots. This also makes them "secret ambassadors" for our city as well as for our country.

As they manage and implement the funded work, young people and their organizations develop leadership skills and become visible within their community's HIV response. These new advocates take their insights and knowledge to policymakers, governments and others to advocate for a more effective HIV response.

Groups with fiscal sponsors must have a written agreement with their fiscal sponsor outlining the terms of the sponsorship. We highly encourage applications from groups that are by and for young people most affected by HIV. This includes young people living with HIV, sex workers, people who use drugs, men who have sex with men, transgender people, and women. The following groups are not eligible for funding: individuals, for-profit organizations, and government institutions, bi-lateral and multi-lateral institutions. Youth-led organizations that have an operating budget of over \$100,000 are ineligible. Non-youth-led organizations which have youth-led projects applying and whose annual organization budget exceeds \$250,000 are ineligible. In addition, you cannot serve on HYLFF's

Community Review Panel and apply for funding as the leader of a project or organization.

Questions about correlations between optimism and hopefulness, for instance, or about the correlations between those states and physical health. In addition, although hope has played a significant role in Judeo-Christian theological traditions, arguments for and from a religious kind of hope remain understudied by contemporary philosophers of religion and analytic theologians.

Human Rights Watch administers the Hellman/Hammett grant program for writers all around the world who have been victims of political persecution and are in financial need. The grants are named for the late American playwright Lillian Hellman and her long-time companion, the novelist Dashiell Hammett. Both were questioned by US congressional committees about their political beliefs and affiliations during the aggressive anti-communist investigations inspired by Senator Joseph McCarthy in the 1950s. Hellman suffered professionally and had trouble finding work. Hammett spent time in prison. In 1989, the trustees appointed in Hellman's will asked Human Rights Watch to devise a program to help writers who were targeted for expressing views that their governments oppose, for criticizing government officials or actions, or for writing about subjects that their governments did not want reported. Over the past 22 years, more than 700 writers from 92 countries have received the program also gives small emergency grants to writers who have an urgent need to leave their country or who need immediate medical treatment after serving prison terms or enduring torture.

**Areas of support:**

In addition to providing much needed financial assistance, the Hellman/Hammett grants focus attention on repression of free speech and censorship by publicizing the persecution that the grant recipients endured. In some cases, the publicity is a protection against further abuse. In other cases, the writers request anonymity because of the dangerous circumstances in which they and their families are living. Free expression is a central human right, enshrined in article 19 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which declares that "everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression; this right

includes freedom to hold opinions without interference and to seek, receive and impart information and ideas through any media and regardless of frontiers.” On July 21, 2011, the Human Rights Committee, the expert body established under the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, reiterated the central importance of freedom of opinion and expression, stating that these freedoms “are indispensable conditions for the full development of the person. They are essential for any society. They constitute the foundation stone for every free and democratic society.” In violation of the fundamental rights to freedom of opinion and expression, governments have used arbitrary arrest and detention, politically motivated criminal charges, and overbroad libel and sedition laws to try to silence writers. The winners of Hellman/Hammett grants are only a small portion of the many writers around the world whose books have been banned or who have been exiled, imprisoned, tortured, and harassed because of their work. Their compelling stories illustrate the importance of insisting that governments respect and protect freedom of opinion and expression.

**General goals:**

Innovations for Poverty Action (IPA) is a research and policy non-profit that discovers and promotes effective solutions to global poverty problems. - Submissions proposing to conduct field-based data collection should specify the research implementing partner organization that will assist the research team with the management and implementation of the randomized evaluation.
- The organization must demonstrate experience implementing randomized evaluations and have a presence in the country.

## 781. Instrument for Pre-Accession Assistance

### General goals:

The Instrument for Pre-Accession Assistance (IPA) is the means by which the EU supports reforms in the 'enlargement countries' with financial and technical help. The IPA funds build up the capacities of the countries throughout the accession process, resulting in progressive, positive developments in the region.

For the period, 2007-2013 IPA had a budget of some € 11.5 billion; its successor, IPA II, will build on the results already achieved by dedicating € 11.7 billion for the period 2014-2020.

Purpose: EU pre-accession funds are a sound investment into the future of both the enlargement countries and the EU itself. They help the beneficiaries make political and economic reforms, preparing them for the rights and obligations that come with EU membership. Those reforms should provide their citizens with better opportunities and allow for development of standards equal to the ones we enjoy as citizens of the

### General goals:

**General goals:**

ICMP works with governments, civil society organizations, justice institutions, international organizations and others throughout the world to address the issue of people who have gone missing because of armed conflict, human rights abuses, disasters, organized crime and other causes.

As the only international organization that is exclusively dedicated to this issue, ICMP is actively engaged in developing institutions and civil society capacity, promoting legislation, fostering social and political advocacy, and developing and providing technical expertise to locate and identify the missing.

ICMP works with governments to develop their institutional capacity to address the issue of missing persons efficiently and impartially. ICMP helps governments develop legislation to safeguard the rights of families of the missing, and it works with civil society organizations to empower them to advocate for their rights.

ICMP assists the process of justice by ensuring that governments adhere to a rule of law-based approach to investigating disappearances and it provides evidence in criminal trials. ICMP directly assists governments with fieldwork. It has been involved in the excavation of more than 3,000 mass and clandestine gravesites and has spearheaded the application of advanced forensic techniques to locate and recover missing persons.

ICMP maintains a unique, specialized Online Inquiry Center (OIC) and Identification Database Management System (iDMS) that manages all data pertaining to its missing person's process.

**Areas of support:**

As part of its mandate, ICMP encourages the active participation of civil society and in particular the families of the missing. It does this through education, training and grant-making programs aimed at empowering family members and others.

In cases where persons are missing as a result of conflict or human rights abuses, ICMP works with survivor groups to rebuild trust between rival groups and within states in transition and to ensure that civil society participates in the creation of institutions, legislation and commemorative events and other forms of memorialization relevant to missing persons.

Furthermore, the use of modern forensic methods to identify the missing requires the voluntary participation of relatives in the provision of reference samples to conduct kinship matching of post-mortem samples. Voluntary participation necessitates intensive education programs in the use of DNA in human identification. It also requires the voluntary consent of relatives to provide personal information, including genetic information.

In an effort to foster a process of dealing with the past, ICMP works directly with members of associations of families of missing persons and other civil society actors to encourage greater cooperation among different religious/national groups in order to solve common problems and advocate for policies that are more effective.







Innovations for Poverty Action (IPA) is a research and policy non-profit that discovers and promotes effective solutions to global poverty problems. IPA brings together researchers and decision-makers to design, rigorously evaluate, and refine these solutions and their applications, ensuring that the evidence created is used to improve the lives of the world's poor.

**Areas of support:**

The Financial Inclusion Program's Financial Services for the Poor Initiative focuses on the development of rigorous evidence on innovations to enable the poor to access, use, and benefit from access to digital financial services. 

We encourage research teams to look beyond heterogeneous effects of financial products on women and actively propose innovative solutions, which can help, close the gender gap that still exists in financial inclusion.

  - The organization must demonstrate experience implementing randomized evaluations and have a presence in the country.

The [International Fund for Agricultural Development](https://www.ifad.org/) (IFAD) is a specialized agency of the United Nations, established as an international financial institution.

IFAD provides grants and low-interest loans in support of pro-poor agriculture and management of natural resources in the developing world. Loans are provided to IFAD's developing member states on terms and conditions, which vary according to the country's per capita income. Grants strengthen technical and institutional capacities linked to agriculture and rural development.

Grant Programs for Agriculture, Energy, Environment, Natural Resources

**1 — Grants for research and technical assistance.** IFAD makes grants for research and capacity building in agriculture, natural resources, and related strategies to address rural poverty. It organizes its grants into those, which it makes available at the country level, and those at regional and global levels.

IFAD's grant recipients include the centers of the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (CGIAR); intergovernmental organizations in which IFAD's member states participate; national governments; civil society organizations; and private-sector entities. Only organizations, which are based in or work in IFAD's member states, are eligible for grants.

Many of the large grants support international agricultural research in networks or at regional scales, as well as other international efforts for rural development. Larger grants are mainly in the range of US\$0.5 million to US\$2 million.

That country's Country Strategic Opportunities Program (COSOP) frames IFAD's operations in a country. Project concepts and subsequent project design must be consistent with the COSOP.

**842. Instrument for Pre-accession Assistance****General goals:**

The Instrument for Pre-accession Assistance (IPA) is the means by which the EU supports reforms in the 'enlargement countries' with financial and technical help. The IPA funds build up the capacities of the countries throughout the accession process, resulting in progressive, positive developments in the region.

For the period, 2007-2013 IPA had a budget of some € 11.5 billion; its successor, IPA II, will build on the results already achieved by dedicating € 11.7 billion for the period 2014-2020.

Purpose: EU pre-accession funds are a sound investment into the future of both the enlargement countries and the EU itself. They help the beneficiaries make political and economic reforms, preparing them for the rights and obligations that come with EU membership. Those reforms should provide their citizens with better opportunities and allow for development of standards equal to the ones we enjoy as citizens of the

EU. The pre-accession funds also help the EU reach its own objectives regarding a sustainable economic recovery, energy supply, transport, the environment and climate change, etc.

**Areas of support:**

Prepared in partnership with the beneficiaries, IPA II sets a new framework for providing pre-accession assistance for the period 2014-2020.

The most important novelty of IPA II is its strategic focus. Country Strategy Papers are the specific strategic planning documents made for each beneficiary for the 7-year period. Finally, it gives more weight to performance measurement: indicators agreed with the beneficiaries will help assess to what extent the expected results have been achieved.

As a draw for private-sector support, the program demonstrates the economic power of soccer, and organizes events and sponsorship packages for private enterprises to secure needed investments and program sustainability. As a result, the Nike Foundation has pledged \$1.8 million and Microsoft contributed \$125,000. By the end of 2008, A Ganar/A Vencer had trained over 3,200 youth in Rio de Janeiro, Quito, and Montevideo.

**Agents of Change:** IDB and MTV Latin America established a partnership in October 2006 to invite young people to share their development projects by submitting a story to an online portal at [www.mtvagentesdecambio.com](http://www.mtvagentesdecambio.com).179

More than 7,000 stories were received in a wide range of topics: from environmental protection, training, micro-enterprise, health, and housing, to art and culture and others. More than 600 were uploaded to the website to be disseminated and evaluated. From those, 25 were selected from seven different countries to be filmed and produced into three-minute segments in which youth and their projects were showcased. The stories were aired on MTV Latin America and local TV stations.

**IDB Youth Network:** This is a regional organization of networks comprised of thousands of youth leaders and organizations interested in the social and economic development of Latin America and the Caribbean. Network members are between 15 and 30 years old and are working or are volunteers for the socioeconomic development of their communities, their countries, and the region. Network members also include institutions working to benefit young people and foster their development. These institutional members are from the public, private, and nongovernmental sectors.





Transnational stories cannot be told without local journalists who are willing to collaborate. However, cross-border investigative journalism does not fit into any traditional business model. As a result, journalists who want to tackle the stories that matter often do not get the chance to do so.

That is where we come in. Journalismfund.eu makes it possible for journalists to investigate stories thoroughly and independently, by operating as a firewall between donors and journalists.

##### **What we do**

We support journalists who have good ideas for in-depth and cross-border research. We focus on two ways of doing so through our activities.

- The first is by giving working grants to journalists that enable them to work on a project over a longer period. We have different grant programmes, such as the European Cross-Border Grants, the Flemish Pascal Decroos Fund Grants and the Intercontinental Connecting Continents Grants (pilot project). The working grants are independent from commercial or political interests. Journalismfund.eu guarantees that the work grants are given under complete, editorial independence.
- The second is by providing networking opportunities for the investigative journalism community to share ideas and methods. Our focus there is our annual Dataharvest Conference, where investigative journalists, data specialists and coders get together to exchange skills and work on stories together.

- Journalismfund.eu supports costs related to journalistic research for all media. This can include travel, translation, access to pay-databases or simply time to research. We do not support fixed costs such as office costs, investments such as cameras or computers, nor do we support production costs.





**940. Lawyering on the Margins Grant Competition**

**General goals:**

The Open Society Public Health Program calls for letters of intent from energetic, rights-oriented organizations to lead and shape the future of the global Lawyering on the Margins initiative.

In different regions and contexts, lawyers have dedicated themselves to advocating for the rights of some of the most excluded people in society, including people who use drugs, sex workers, and people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and intersex (LGBTI), whose marginalized status makes them

vulnerable to poor health outcomes, as well as abuses from police and the justice system, health care workers, family members, and others.

The critical work of asserting the rights of marginalized people and protecting them from ill treatment attracts attorneys deeply committed to equal rights and access to justice. However, lawyers representing marginalized communities are themselves often struggling against great odds with little support.

The Public Health Program is now looking for new and creative ideas from an organization committed to the promotion and defense of the rights of marginalized communities.

**Areas of support:**

In 2011, the Open Society Public Health Program hosted the first Lawyering on the Margins (LOTM) convening in Copenhagen, bringing together lawyers from 15 countries for three days to meet, network and exchange strategies for ensuring that people who use drugs, sex workers, and LGBTI groups have access to justice and strong representation on their side. The LOTM initiative formalizes and elevates a community of lawyers upholding the rights of marginalized groups, recognizes the work of these pioneering lawyers, and establishes an important and legitimate field of rights-based work.

Based on partner demand, subsequent LOTM conferences took place in Cape Town (2012), Vancouver (2014), and Ohrid/Skopje (2015), providing a space for lawyers to share ideas and strategize creatively. The LOTM is highly valued by the lawyers who have attended these conferences and connected with one another through the LOTM network. As it has evolved, the LOTM has come to fill an important niche, facilitating peer learning and a community of lawyers engaged in innovative work with marginalized populations. It has inspired important new ideas and collaborative projects advancing access to justice and the right to health.

Research Fellowships: Offering up to £ 50,000 over a period of three to twenty-four months are awarded to experienced researchers, particularly those whose day-to-day responsibilities have prevented them from completing a programme of research. There are no restrictions on discipline, and applications are welcomed from established independent scholars as well as those holding posts in higher education institutions.

Major Research Fellowships: Supporting well-established academics in the humanities and social sciences to focus for two or three years on a specific piece of significant, original research. The scheme is particularly aimed at researchers whose day-to-day duties have prevented them from completing a programme of research.

Emeritus Fellowships: Providing funding over up to two years for senior researchers who have retired from an academic post to complete a research project, and prepare the results for publication. The awards offer research expenses of up to £ 22,000, but do not provide maintenance for the applicant.

Visiting Professorships: Awarded to UK institutions that wish to invite an eminent researcher from overseas to enhance the knowledge and skills of academic staff or the student body within the host

institution. The scheme covers maintenance, travel expenses and research costs. Visiting Professorships last for between three and twelve months.

**Study Abroad Studentships:** Supporting an extended period of advanced study or research at a center of learning in any overseas country, with the exception of the USA. Applicants need to have been resident in the UK for at least five years, and should be either currently a student, or have been registered as a student in the last eight years. applications for assistance. The terms “sustainability” and “sustainable development” are applied as defined in Agenda 21. There is no such thing as a legal right to eligibility for Foundation assistance.

**Maritime theme:** In accordance with the orientation of the LF, projects and measures must have a maritime theme and be suitable as models for follow-up projects and measures in other regions of the world. They must be of such a nature as to make people in other regions receptive to the theme and make a concrete contribution to an enhanced awareness of the maritime world.

Receptivity for and an awareness of sustainable development should not be narrowed down to sustained utilization of maritime resources. The important thing is to make it clear that the natural world in its biological and physical phenomenology is of value per se and cannot be reduced to the isolated aspect of satisfaction of human needs.

The usefulness and visibility factor of a project or measure are closely related in the view of the LF. A high profile and widespread dissemination of information on activities generate the kind of positive attention and curiosity maritime themes and problems deserve. What we need to evaluate a project or measure is a clear-cut description of the contribution it will make. Coastal regions are the target regions for measures and projects geared to sustained development in the maritime field. The ecological land/sea boundary is at the same time the human/sea interface and thus the focal point of the relevant ecological, economic and social challenges.

Interdisciplinary and inter-sector activities constitute the most promising approaches for initiation of sustained development processes in the maritime field. The concerns of regional populations must be a central focus and local personalities should be engaged as driving forces behind the activities.

**Methods of project realization:** Both the methods and organization employed by institutions and persons responsible for the projects or measures must reflect the principle of sustainability.

**Regional developmental impulses:** Projects and measures aiming at co-operation on regional development must generate clearly defined and recognizable developmental impulses within a patently regional framework.

The objective must be to improve the living conditions of the regional population in a sustainable manner and to contribute directly to a palpable reduction of resource consumption.

**Exemplary function:** Projects and measures geared solely to an individual situation with little relevance to wider circles can only be applied to other situations in other regions at considerable expense. The higher the exemplary profile of a project or measure, the greater it's utility for the seas and oceans on a global scale.

Synergistic effects: Projects and measures that are to receive financial assistance from the LF must also take into account commitments from other donor organizations. Redundancies in donor work must be avoided, although similarly the activities of other donors can certainly be integrated to create beneficial synergistic effects.

Utilization of financial means: The LF always considers financial aid in terms of the scope and focus of the resulting contribution to Foundation goals and to a solution of the essential problem as formulated in the project application.

LifeWeb does not manage its own funds. Rather, it operates as a match-making service between governments that request funding for protected areas, and donors willing and able to provide it.

National governments of developing countries define funding needs for protected areas, and submit these Expressions of Interest to LifeWeb's Coordination Office. LifeWeb publicizes the Expressions of Interest, and strives to match them with the geographical and thematic priorities of public and private donors.

Grant Programs for Agriculture, Energy, Environment, Natural Resources

**Finance for protected areas.** Governments of developing and transition countries prepare Expressions of Interest at the scale of a national system of protected areas, or at a project scale of one or more protected areas. Each Expression of Interest contains a funding request to expand or increase the effectiveness of ecosystem services provided by protected areas.

In cases where donors respond to the funding requests, the money flows directly from the donor to the recipient government through existing mechanisms of international cooperation.

Grant commitments ("matches") by donors range from under US\$100 thousand to multi-million pledges over several years.

The League of Arab States (also known as the Arab League) is a voluntary association of independent countries whose population is mainly Arabic speaking. It seeks to strengthen ties among the member states, coordinate policies, and promote common interests. It was founded in 1945 with states joining progressively over time. Its membership now extends to 22 states. It is involved in political, economic, cultural, and social programs designed to promote the interests of member states. It has served as a forum for member states to coordinate their policy positions and deliberate on matters of common concern, settling some Arab disputes and limiting conflicts. It has played an important role in shaping

school curricula, and preserving manuscripts and Arab cultural heritage. It also encourages measures against crime and drug abuse, and deals with labor issues (particularly among the emigrant Arab workforce) and with issues of intellectual property and information and communication technology promotion.

The League of Arab States emphasizes the role, strengthening, and empowerment of Arab youth, and endorses young people as a principal factor in the development of the Arab region. For this purpose, a League of Arab States Youth Forum is held annually. The objectives of the forum are:

- exchanging knowledge, successful stories, ideas, and suggestions concerned with the various dimensions of dialogue among social groups with different cultures;
- crystallizing suggestions and mechanisms for enhancing the role of Arab and European youth in fostering intercultural dialogue within the Arab region and activating Euro-Arab cultural dialogue. Also to support exchange, partnership, and joint actions between Arab and European youth leading to intercultural interaction and complementarity;
- identifying youth ideas and suggestions to enhance the role of the League of Arab States and its organizations in holding a continuous and creative intercultural and inter-religious dialogue at the Arab, Mediterranean, and international levels;
- proposing elements for a youth joint vision initiated from what is known as a “transnational cultural” approach one that enhances intercultural dialogue and complementarity values and ensures the sustainability of common interests and values for all nations, and limits discrimination, prejudice, and the false conflict among civilizations.



Movies that Matter film screenings would not be complete without an expansion programme, in the form of discussions, debates, talk shows, introductions, speeches or Q&A sessions, to further explore the subject matter of the films shown on the big screen. This trademark sets us apart from other film festivals. Human rights defenders, filmmakers, experts, politicians, journalists and representatives of social organisations jointly analyze the situations in which human rights are at stake in order to put things in perspective.

### Areas of support:

Every year at the end of March, Movies that Matter Festival comes to The Hague. Eighteen film theatres take turns to present a monthly film followed by a debate as part of the Movies that Matter on Tour. Movies that Matter also offers education programmes for elementary and secondary schools as well as higher educational establishments. 

The Matra Social Transformation Program contributes to promoting security, cooperation, and democracy in Central and Eastern Europe and selected countries bordering the European Union (EU). Since 1994, the Dutch government has used Matra to encourage social regeneration in countries throughout the region. The program's aim is to support the transformation to a democratic society governed by the rule of law. It therefore supports activities that promote reform of the state and its institutions, civil society organizations, and the connections between them.

Matra currently operates in two new EU member states (Bulgaria and Romania), three candidate countries for EU accession (Croatia, Macedonia, Turkey), five potential EU candidate countries (Albania, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Kosovo, Montenegro, Serbia), six of the EU's Eastern neighbors to the east (Armenia, Belarus, Georgia, Moldova, the Russian Federation, Ukraine), and six Mediterranean countries (Algeria, Jordan, Lebanon, Morocco, Syria, Tunisia). The 12 qualifying themes of the Matra program are legislation and law, public administration/public order/police, human rights/minorities, environment, biodiversity, housing, information and the media, culture, welfare, health care, labor and social policy, and education. NZAID is the agency within the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade that manages New Zealand's official development assistance (ODA) program and provides policy advice on international development issues. Its mission is to support sustainable development in developing countries in order to reduce poverty and to contribute to a more secure, equitable, and prosperous world. NZAID has undergone rapid growth since its establishment in 2002. In the 2006–7 fiscal year, NZAID managed 1,200 international development contracts and administered a total budget of NZD 430 million. Its primary geographic focus is the Pacific and Southeast Asia region.

**Education:** While most of New Zealand's education aid has gone into higher education in the form of scholarships, since 2000 the focus has shifted toward increased support for the provision of basic education in order to achieve the internationally agreed Education for All goals by 2015. NZAID recognizes that a quality basic education, from early childhood through secondary education, is a

fundamental human right and a critical tool to reduce poverty. NZAID will maintain education's share of total development assistance at approximately one-third and, within this share, work toward increasing the funding for basic education to 50% of the total education budget.

One program in which NZAID is a lead donor is Education for All in the Solomon Islands. Since 2003, this program has worked to strengthen management of the formal education system, developed a program to upgrade school infrastructure, revised the curriculum and distributed textbooks and teaching aids to primary schools, and supported Waikato University to train sufficient numbers of teachers. The program has since resulted in the introduction fee-free basic education, allowing more children to attend school and gain the education they need.

**Research:** NZAID engages with development-related research in a variety of ways. Through its International Development Research Fund, New Zealand

based researchers (academics, nongovernmental organizations researchers, and the staff of research organizations) work in partnership with researchers from developing countries. Research supported by the fund focuses on advancing developing policy and practice in the regions. Postgraduate field research awards offer students from New Zealand universities the opportunity to work in developing countries. Several networks are supported by NZAID to connect academics, students, and development practitioners, such as DevNet, and policymaking and research institutes, such as the Oceania Development Network. While research is not exclusively youth-focused, possibilities for projects on children and youth-related issues exist through these channels.

Between 2004 and 2009, US\$950 million was disbursed in EEA grants, with Norway contributing 97% of the funding. Beneficiary countries are the 12 states that have joined the EU since 2004, as well as Greece, Spain, and Portugal. Among the priority areas of this program, several are relevant to children and young people, including health and childcare, education and human resources, and good governance and participation. #### 1040. NORTH–SOUTH CENTER, COUNCIL OF EUROPE

The European Center for Global Interdependence and Solidarity, more commonly known as the North-South Center, was set up by the Council of Europe in Lisbon, Portugal, in May 1990. It has the dual objective of advancing European cooperation to heighten public awareness of global interdependence issues, and of promoting policies of solidarity, respect for human rights, democracy, and social cohesion. A specific objective of the North-South Center is to provide training and capacity building of young people and youth organizations outside of Europe, and several programs are undertaken addressing African youth.

**Africa-Europe Training Course for Youth Organizations:** This long-term training course for trainers on Africa-Europe youth cooperation is held annually or bi-annually. Over the period of one year, 30 trainers per course participate in a curriculum that consists of four elements: two week-long residential training seminars, a practice phase, a virtual learning and communication platform, and a mentoring process. In so doing, the course hopes to strengthen the role of youth organizations as civil society actors, and to advance active citizenship among young people in Africa and Europe. It focuses building the capacity of multipliers in youth organizations in Europe and Africa, and equipping them with skills necessary for Africa–Europe cooperation programs. Past courses took place in 2002, 2004, 2005, 2006, and 2008.

**Africa-Europe Youth Summit:** Taking place Lisbon, Portugal, in 2007, the summit brought together 250 youth representatives of Africa and Europe, and 60 observers, representing governments, regional and international organizations, and media. It aimed to increase young people’s participation in Euro-African cooperation and to reinforce youth work in Africa and Europe by influencing the youth policy. The summit concluded with a final declaration that was delivered to the heads of state during the second EU-Africa Summit.

**African University on Youth and Development:** Taking place for the first time in 2009, the African University on Youth and Development aimed at creating a space for debate and reflection, affirmative youth action and promotion of youth policies, training and non-formal education, as well as intercultural and interregional dialogue within the context of Euro-African youth cooperation and the follow-up of the Africa Europe Youth Summit. One hundred youth leaders from Africa and Europe came together in Tarrafal, Cape Verde, for a week to live and learn together and to co-develop training activities and

political participation of youth in the context of Euro-African cooperation. The university is organized by the North-South Center of the Council of Europe in partnership with the National Youth Council of Portugal, Cape Verde Federation of Youth, the European Youth Forum, and the Pan-African Youth Union, with the support of the European Commission and the Community of Portuguese-Speaking Countries (CPLP). ### **Expeditions Council Grant Application**

The Expeditions Council is an editorially driven grant program that supports exploration and adventure worldwide. Proposed projects must have the potential to yield compelling stories and images. Applications are also judged on the qualifications of applicants and their teams, and on the project's merit, uniqueness and safety protocols. The Council consists of representatives of National Geographic editorial divisions (magazines, television, books, website, and so on) who review and vote on grant applications, as well as an advisory board of external consultants.

While the Expeditions Council funds a broad range of exploration and adventure, if a project is based on scientific inquiry, applicants must provide detailed methodology. In addition, all projects must adhere to applicable scientific or professional ethical standards, which are outlined in the grant application and are subject to scientific review

The Expeditions Council offers its grantees the opportunity to work effectively with National Geographic's many divisions. Grantees are therefore able to share the results of their expeditions with National Geographic's global audience. Applicants are expected to have qualifications and experience pertinent to the expedition or project they propose. Advanced academic degrees may be required, depending on the nature of the project. Those planning work in foreign countries (i.e., a country other than their own) must include at least one local collaborator as part of their expedition team. International applicants are encouraged; however, submissions must be made in English.

Grants generally range from U.S. \$15,000 to \$35,000 and cover direct field expenses: transportation, supplies, subsistence, and permit costs as well as other related fees (e.g., interpreters, guides, and porters) that are tied to the project.



**Project Funding**

The aim of project funding grants is to strengthen Nordic identity by supporting children's and youth participation in activities regarding cultural, political, and social affairs in the North, and to enhance the possibility for children and youth to strengthen the Nordic profile in international relations. Grants are given to time-limited projects that contribute to increasing contact between children and youth in the North. Grants can be given to organizations and other groups of children and young people (e.g., youth

schools, youth clubs, cooperation between friendship municipalities, folk high schools) to organize seminars, courses, conferences, camps, publications, and other events. This grant gives priority to participants up to age 25, although young people up to age 29 are considered as long as they have the primary initiative and responsibility throughout the process from idea development to final evaluation. Priority is given to projects involving disabled children and youth and to those involving minority groups.<sup>153</sup>

2.3 Europe

Competitions and championships are given low priority. Eligible organizations have shared statutes and members in at least three Nordic countries or autonomous regions: Denmark, Greenland, Finland, the Faroe Islands, Iceland, Norway, Sweden, and the Åland Islands. Project organizers must provide co-financing through participation fees or other grants. Grants can be given to cover travel, board and lodging, rental fees for venues, fees for speakers and other experts, assistance for participants with disabilities, and publications. Grants are not given to cover procurement of office supplies or acquisition of premises. Applications for project grants are assessed quarterly.

#### **Organizational Funding**

Children and youth organizations with members in at least three Nordic countries can apply for grants for the planning and development of their Nordic cooperation. Eligible activities include planning meetings, information materials, and the like. Projects are assessed once a year and have an October 1 deadline. Organizations must be grant-entitled as a national child or youth organization or a concept-based organization, have at least 50% of its members under the age of 25, and have a democratic organizational structure. If the organization does not meet the first criterion and, therefore, applies for grants under the second, the statutes and a confirmation of the number of the organization's members must be enclosed. Grants are not given to sports or professional organizations.



The OSCE conducts a wide range of activities related to all three dimensions of security—human, political-military, and economic-environmental. The OSCE employs about 3,000 staff in 18 missions and field operations located in Southeastern Europe, the Caucasus, Eastern Europe, and Central Asia. They work to facilitate political processes, prevent or settle conflicts, and promote civil society and the rule of law. The OSCE does not have a centralized youth program, but according to needs identified on the ground in countries where it is active, it has developed youth-specific programming. Many of the OSCE's regional and local programs have a strong youth dimension, involving young people in all kinds of educational activities to promote civil society reconciliation and community and human development; youth democratic leadership; and human rights, among others. Particularly in Southeastern Europe, the OSCE has promoted youth participation in its programs as both beneficiaries and drivers of change. Several OSCE missions in Southeast European countries have hired youth program managers. 

### **Introduction**

The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development is called a think-tank, monitoring agency, rich man's club, an unacademic university. It has elements of all, but none of these characterizations captures the essence of the OECD.

The OECD groups its 30 member-countries in an organisation that, most importantly, provides governments with a setting in which to discuss, develop and perfect economic and social policy. They compare experiences, seek answers to common problems and work to co-ordinate domestic and international policies that increasingly, in today's globalized world, must form a web of even practice across nations. Their exchanges may lead to agreements to act in a formal way, for example, by establishing legally binding codes for free flow of capital and services, agreements to crack down on bribery or to end subsidies for shipbuilding. But more often, their discussion makes for better-informed work, within their own governments on the spectrum of public policy and clarifies the impact of national policies on the international community. And it offers a chance to reflect and exchange perspectives with other countries similar to their own.

Exchanges between OECD governments flow from information and analysis provided by a Secretariat in Paris. Parts of the OECD Secretariat collect data, monitor trends, analyze and forecast economic developments, while others research social changes or evolving patterns in trade, environment, agriculture, technology, taxation and more. This work, in areas that mirror the policy-making structures in ministries of governments, is done in close consultation with policy makers who will use the analysis and it underpins discussion by member countries when they meet in specialized committees of the OECD.



**1099. Organizational Development Grants to Think Tanks****General goals:**

A robust policy process is critical to building open society. It offers a venue for wide public participation, enables a discussion of ideas informed by evidence, and prevents attempts to establish a monopoly on truth.

Strengthening such processes is critical to Open Society's mandate of ensuring justice, advancing human rights, promoting transparency, and ending discrimination. Out of the many participants in the policy process, we focus on think tanks because they strengthen democratic processes by: 1) identifying political, economic, and social problems, 2) researching them in a nonpartisan and scientifically rigorous manner, and 3) providing policy alternatives that enrich public debate. Think tanks are vital not only because they advocate specific remedies, but also because these remedies are informed by carefully accumulated and analyzed data, making them harder to ignore than emotional normative appeals or isolated instances of abuse.

The majority of donors operating in the field of policy research provide project funding for analytical materials on specific topics. As a result, both public policy centers and their funders focus almost exclusively on particular policy outputs and their immediate advocacy at the expense of pursuing deeper institutional development of think tanks. This creates a niche for the Think Tank Fund to assist the overall development of grantees in three specific areas: quality of research products, communications and advocacy capacity and internal development and governance. Our mission is to contribute to building strong think tanks that produce high-quality policy analysis, deliver it to a wide range of

audiences to galvanize public interest and debate, and operate as sustainable and internally robust non-profit organizations.

Organizational development grants aim to provide support for improvement in the three specific areas of think tank activity and operation mentioned above. An organizational development grant can cover from one to all three areas for a period between one to two years based on an applicant's demands, merit of the proposal, and the time needed for implementing necessary changes.

**Areas of support:**

Organizational development grants support only the development component of independent policy research actors. Prior to receiving a grant, applicants will have to analyze what does and does not work inside the organization. They will be the drivers of change by presenting a detailed plan for overall organizational development and clearly indicating in which of the three areas (research, communications, and internal management) they require improvement and how they will implement it.

Applicants will also be required to show how any grant expenses are tied to proposed changes in improving quality of research products, communications and advocacy capacity, and internal development and governance. For example, if a think tank applies for funding to help make its policy briefs more methodologically rigorous, the Think Tank Fund would be able to cover part of the salary for a policy analyst or a fee to a peer reviewer, but not for an accountant or even a senior researcher if neither works on improving this aspect of work. At the same time, the Think Tank Fund believes that any change requires general organizational investment and is willing to cover part of an applicant's overhead cost.



*\*The Roma Initiatives Office defines a Roma NGO as an organization in which at least 50 percent of the membership (in the case of associations), the governance body, and the senior management openly declare their Roma ethnic origin.*

### **1109. Organizational Development Grants to Think Tanks**

#### **General goals:**

A robust policy process is critical to building open society. It offers a venue for wide public participation, enables a discussion of ideas informed by evidence, and prevents attempts to establish a monopoly on truth.

Strengthening such processes is critical to Open Society's mandate of ensuring justice, advancing human rights, promoting transparency, and ending discrimination. Out of the many participants in the policy process, we focus on think tanks because they strengthen democratic processes by: 1) identifying political, economic, and social problems, 2) researching them in a nonpartisan and scientifically rigorous manner, and 3) providing policy alternatives that enrich public debate. Think tanks are vital not only because they advocate specific remedies, but also because these remedies are informed by carefully accumulated and analyzed data, making them harder to ignore than emotional normative appeals or isolated instances of abuse.

The majority of donors operating in the field of policy research provide project funding for analytical materials on specific topics. As a result, both public policy centers and their funders focus almost exclusively on particular policy outputs and their immediate advocacy at the expense of pursuing deeper institutional development of think tanks. This creates a niche for the Think Tank Fund to assist the overall development of grantees in three specific areas: quality of research products, communications and advocacy capacity and internal development and governance. Our mission is to contribute to building strong think tanks that produce high-quality policy analysis, deliver it to a wide range of audiences to galvanize public interest and debate, and operate as sustainable and internally robust non-profit organizations.

Organizational development grants aim to provide support for improvement in the three specific areas of think tank activity and operation mentioned above. An organizational development grant can cover

from one to all three areas for a period between one to two years based on an applicant's demands, merit of the proposal, and the time needed for implementing necessary changes.

**Areas of support:**

Organizational development grants support only the development component of independent policy research actors. Prior to receiving a grant, applicants will have to analyze what does and does not work inside the organization. They will be the drivers of change by presenting a detailed plan for overall organizational development and clearly indicating in which of the three areas (research, communications, and internal management) they require improvement and how they will implement it.

Applicants will also be required to show how any grant expenses are tied to proposed changes in improving quality of research products, communications and advocacy capacity, and internal development and governance. For example, if a think tank applies for funding to help make its policy briefs more methodologically rigorous, the Think Tank Fund would be able to cover part of the salary for a policy analyst or a fee to a peer reviewer, but not for an accountant or even a senior researcher if neither works on improving this aspect of work. At the same time, the Think Tank Fund believes that any change requires general organizational investment and is willing to cover part of an applicant's overhead cost.

## Community and Solidarity

### **General goals:**

Critical philosopher and historian of science, Paul K. Feyerabend was an ardent defender of everyone's freedom to think, decide and determine one's own priorities and values. The right to enjoy this freedom should be guaranteed to all persons and communities against any attempts to limit its reach for the profit of a few. This "freedom", however, should not be separated from a critical perspective towards itself and its own principles and embedded culture— without which it could become an abstract self-created prison. It is important to take one's own ideas not too seriously and to understand tolerance, empathy and solidarity in human communities as values more important than abstract logical principles— even more important than the cult of one's own "truth".

The Foundation is inspired by these ideas and attempts to follow the style of the work of Paul K. Feyerabend — sincerely appreciating the complexity of human experience and refusing both the tyranny of "Reason" and the imposition of methods. The Foundation aims to:

"The Paul K. Feyerabend Foundation promotes social justice, human rights, bio-cultural diversity and the empowerment and well-being of human communities via community solidarity and mutual aid, as well as via collective reflexion, organisation and action."

Following this public interest objective, the Foundation excludes all profit or commercial purposes. It supports, in Switzerland and abroad, projects, organisations and/or individuals acting for human solidarity in favor of communities in need. The initiatives sponsored by the Foundation are centered on the capacities of those communities to understand and to act, which need to be developed, strengthened and given value to improve their lives and conserve their natural environment. The interaction with these communities engages them in solidarity as joint decision-makers and actors— never as "targets" of initiatives conceived elsewhere. The Foundation supports initiatives that respect local cultural identities while facilitating the critical analysis of their own tenets, as well as of the tenets of other cultures. It acts to promote biological and cultural diversity, the respect of human rights and the environmental consciousness of everyone in society.

The Foundation can provide grants, subsidies, prizes, fellowships, interest-free loans, free financial guarantees and any other type of aid compatible with the objectives of the Foundation and its status as a non-profit organisation.

### **Areas of support:**

The two notions which are at the center of our Foundation have been discussed extensively within the Board. They do indeed invite discussion, are subject to varying interpretations and may provoke polemics.

This is why we have decided to publish here various documents which we found useful in our thinking about the subject and which motivate our activities. Other texts published here develop complementary points of view, or make our approach and the values we defend more precise.

**Community:** A community is a group of persons having something in common. This definition being too vast to be useful, it is convenient to read it in the light of socio-historical contexts which interest the Foundation. There exists a plethora of human “communities” in the ordinary sense; they share a territory, a city quarter, natural resources, a language, a culture, traditions, etc. These socio-cultural communities are crucial for the work of the Foundation.

There also exist human communities which are centered around one or several common issues or interests but whose members may not be linked geographically or culturally. The link that makes them members of such a community may be non-material, like for example professional, ideological or political interests. Such communities are also very important for the work of the Foundation. The Foundation therefore has to take into account the different types of existing communities, but also the fact that each individual simultaneously belongs to several communities. In general, individuals will decide, depending on needs and context, to which community they belong prioritarly. To determine whether solidarity is being practiced within a classical community, or within a community centered around non-material issues, is one of the main steps in identifying the communities which concern the Foundation.

**Solidarity:** Solidarity is first of all an attitude and a value. It means the acceptance of the other’s humanity, and turns the other into an equal subject, independently of possible social, economic, political or other differences. But solidarity is also an active engagement – between individuals, within a community, or between different communities – for instance to defend or to reinforce a common good or a common interest.

Solidarity often, but not always, expresses itself in a move towards those who suffer or are discriminated against, i.e., in a voluntary action whose goal is to offer others material or symbolic resources (financial, natural, intellectual, organisational or social acceptance aid). This interaction distinguishes itself from charity by questioning differences in power, including those between donor and receiver.

In any event, solidarity contributes to creating or reinforcing links between certain actors and strives to liberate them from certain types of domination (contrary to charity which maintains the social order). In the globalised world dominated by merciless economical, political and financial powers, solidarity is one of the weapons of men and women fighting for more humane living conditions. And on a yet more general level, solidarity is the means to give more sense to human relations, to go beyond the mere fulfilment of basic needs, or manifold induced desires.

**Application procedures:**

The Foundation functions with a network of qualified individuals called nominators. These represent the links between the Foundation and the individuals, the communities and organisations which carry the actions supported by the Foundation, and those proposed as candidates for the Paul K. Feyerabend Prize. The nominators receive the applications for support, ask questions which help to formulate the projects, and transmit those applications to the Foundation which they deem eligible and promising. All individuals, communities, organisations which have a project for which they would like to be supported by the Foundation should therefore contact a nominator who is close to them or, in case they do not know any, turn to [secretariat@pkfeyerabend.org](mailto:secretariat@pkfeyerabend.org)

**Eligibility criteria:**

The Board chooses the initiatives to be supported by the Foundation, on the basis of expected results and in accordance with the Foundation's objectives. The quality of the projects, the innovative character of their approach and their feasibility are another essential criterion of choice. For example, the Board will give preference to

- Initiatives expected to yield a substantial improvement towards the desired objectives;
- Exemplary initiatives which are capable to inspire and to motivate other people;
- Initiatives capable of reinforcing or generating the solidarity of the communities concerned;
- Initiatives which, with a small initial impulse, are liable to generate other initiatives and/or render themselves sustainable;
- Initiatives which do not receive any other support because of their pioneering nature;
- Initiatives which are based on plausible working hypotheses, and are carried by actors capable of realizing them.

PeaceNexus is a Swiss-based Foundation established in May 2009. It was founded by Anne Gloor and has been supported since its inception by the endowment granted by the philanthropist Hansjorg Wyss.

When philanthropist Hansjorg Wyss suggested in early 2008 to set up a foundation to address some challenges in peacebuilding that I had mentioned to him, it took me several months to come up with a plan.

Identifying problems is one thing; finding ways to address them is tougher.

WHY – some problems inspiring the PeaceNexus concept:

- People driving change in peacebuilding organisations (as probably in any organisation) work twice as hard, take risks in change-averse systems, and their efforts are not always acknowledged even if they succeed;
- The development of new ideas, and innovation in general, lacks funding; there is seldom a budget for it in (inter-)governmental organisations; and NGOs have trouble raising donor funding for proper project development;
- There is a lack of collaboration between organisations working on peace despite the fact that peacebuilding requires combined efforts at different levels and between different communities of expertise;

Despite its decisive role in development and its huge influence on governments, the business community is a neglected actor in peacebuilding.

WHAT – in response to these problems, I suggested that PeaceNexus should:

- Strengthen change makers and innovators in peacebuilding;
- Assist impactful organisations to meet key peacebuilding challenges beyond their core-business;
- Foster collaboration between peacebuilders; and
- Promote the role of business in peacebuilding.

HOW – the PeaceNexus approach we chose:

PeaceNexus provides tailored advice to peacebuilding actors that we believe can make a difference. Upon a request from an organisation, we assess the problem, the organisation and the specific assistance required.

We develop the project with the “client” and then hire experts to implement it (for more about the process click <http://peacenexus.org/?p=341>).

**Development Assistance** – The proposed activities should help bring about long-term improvements to the quality of life of poor people in more than one way. These activities should aim to increase self-reliance and empowerment of poor people.

**Public Policy Advocacy** – The proposed activities will advocate through just and peaceful means, political and/or economic policy changes which a) provide food for poor and hungry people; b) empower their self-development; or c) promote freedom from oppressive and unjust systems that fail to meet basic needs.

**Lifestyle Integrity** – The proposed activities will assist the church to move toward sustainable corporate and personal lifestyles sensitive to the reality of the earth's limited resources and the critical needs of the poorest of the human family.

**Education and Interpretation** – The proposed activities will educate the church and the public at large about local and global root causes of hunger in a particular country and around the world. They shall prepare and motivate people to act and to educate others and provide opportunities for being in solidarity with and learning among poor communities.

2. The proposal will work to lessen hunger and poverty and to address their causes.
  3. The proposed activity will come from an organization. Proposals will not be accepted if they come from private businesses or from individuals. The PHP will not accept applications from governmental structures.
  4. The proposed activity will benefit poor people, especially women, racial ethnic persons or other disadvantaged groups. Those benefitting will be involved in the planning and implementation of these activities.
  5. The proposed activities will promote a just sharing of the earth's resources and the protection of the environment.
  6. The organization which is applying will have good working relations in its own country with a national church body, whether or not it is a formal partner of the Presbyterian Church USA. It also may show existing relationships with community organizations, government agencies and other programs that share the same goals. In order to support local self-reliance, PHP will give priority to applications submitted by organizations in the geographic area of the proposed activities.

The key actors of DIS in Turkey were designated by the Prime Ministry Circular of the 18th

July 2001 as follows:

- The National Fund and the National Authorizing Officer (NAO),
- The National Aid Coordinator (NAC) – NIPAC in IPA,
- The Central Finance and Contracts Unit (CFCU) and Programme Authorizing Officer (PAO),
- The Senior Programme Officers (SPOs) in line ministries, and
- The Financial Cooperation Committee (FCC).

Subsequently, “Pre-Accession Financial Assistance for Turkey” was adopted by the Council Regulation

No. 2500/2001 of 17th December 2001. Consequently, the CFCU was established by the Memorandum of

Understanding (MoU) signed between the EU Commission and the Turkish Government on 14th February

2002 which was subsequently ratified by the Grand National Assembly with the Law No.4802 on 30th January

2003. By this Law, the CFCU was designated with the sole responsibility over the all budgeting, tendering, contracting, payments accounting and financial reporting aspects of the procurement of the services, supplies, works and grants in the context of the EU funded programmes in Turkey. In 2003 also, management of financial assistance to Turkey is conferred by the EU Commission on a decentralized basis to the CFCU.

1180. **Quantified Society: Examining the Consequences of**

**Algorithmic Decision Making for Open Societies**

**General goals:**

The rise of algorithmic decision making is fraught with contradictory effects. Technological advancements enable us to render into data aspects of the world that have never been quantified before. There are benefits to the use of this new technology, and there are inherent dangers. For example, predictive analytics is increasingly used by governments to allocate resources such as police forces more efficiently, but also to profile and single out groups and individuals. Corporations use it as well. With the help of "numbercrunching at scale," the U.S. retailer Target figured out a teen girl was pregnant long before her father did.

Facebook manipulated its users' emotional states by modifying their news feeds. And the National Security Agency's metadata program, uncovered by whistle-blower Edward Snowden, is a clear example of data-enabled government overreach.

What all these stories have in common is that algorithmic decision making leads to a change in the power relationship between the profiler and the profiled. The profiler has the power to foresee behavior and pre-empt our intent, mostly without our knowledge. As the "internet of things" expands and daily objects become data-collecting devices, the playing field becomes more uneven by the day.

In response to this phenomenon, the Open Society Information Program, in collaboration with the Ford Foundation, is announcing a call for proposals for case studies from the Global South and Europe that will

(a) identify implications for open society values such as the protection of human rights and democratic practice of large-scale data collection, analysis, and use, and (b) provide legislative, normative, or technical recommendations for how to respond to those implications. This research is intended to help inform public policy discussions and drive the development of frameworks that incorporate provisions

to strengthen human rights protection and encourage the innovation made possible by this rapidly evolving environment.



The Convention's mission is "the conservation and wise use of all wetlands through local and national actions and international cooperation, as a contribution towards achieving sustainable development throughout the world".

Wetlands are among the most diverse and productive ecosystems. They provide essential services and supply all our fresh water. However, they continue to be degraded and converted to other uses. The Convention uses a broad definition of wetlands. It includes all lakes and rivers, underground aquifers,

swamps and marshes, wet grasslands, peatlands, oases, estuaries, deltas and tidal flats, mangroves and other coastal areas, coral reefs, and all human-made sites such as fish ponds, rice paddies, reservoirs and salt pans.

Under the “three pillars” of the Convention, the Contracting Parties commit to:

- work towards the wise use of all their wetlands;
- designate suitable wetlands for the list of Wetlands of International Importance (the “Ramsar List”) and ensure their effective management; and
- cooperate internationally on transboundary wetlands, shared wetland systems and shared species.

**Areas of support:**

The Parties to the Convention established the Small Grants Fund (SGF) in 1990 to help developing countries support the conservation and wise use of wetland resources, and the sustainable development of communities which depend on them and care for them. Since then, the Fund has provided over eight million Swiss Francs to over 240 projects from 110 countries.

The Ramsar Small Grants Fund relies entirely upon voluntary contributions from governments and individuals. Support for projects is accepted year-round. Donors can support projects in whole, if they wish to pick a country project, or give any amount of money to the SGF Fund in general. This amount will be attributed to the best project.



Emergency Funding for Conservation

**General goals:**

The Rapid Response Facility (RRF) is a small grants programme that provides emergency funding to address severe and time sensitive threats to endangered biodiversity, primarily within UNESCO natural World Heritage sites. To fulfil this emergency response role, the RRF operates quickly, flexibly and in real time. The inability to respond to emergencies or catastrophic events as soon as they arise can lead to devastating results for biodiversity and ecosystems. By enabling relevant stakeholders to address such emergencies within just days or weeks, the RRF invests in the long-term survival of unique natural sites and their biodiversity.

To ensure effective responses to conservation emergencies, the RRF aims to:

- Make funding decisions within an average eight working days from receipt of applications;
- Mobilize funds quickly to respond to emergency situations in natural World Heritage sites, and occasionally in other sites of high biodiversity value;
- Provide bridging funds for sites where longer-term funding is being sought – thus helping to help ensure sustainability of RRF interventions; and

- Catalyse innovative financing initiatives as part of long-term support for sites.

Read more about the conservation impacts that RRF funding has made possible.

The RRF is designed to deliver rapid conservation funding in times of crisis, with a focus on protecting UNESCO's natural World Heritage sites and potential sites. 



### **1203. Rational Games**

#### **General goals:**

Rational Games, Inc. (RGI) is a consulting, training and coaching service organization dedicated to the employment of games and game-like simulations to resolve conflict. We believe that the delight of play unlocks deep potential for conflict resolution, and helps parties engaged in a dispute to learn to move beyond both positions and interests, and create a truly open conversation with one another, one that addresses the identity and commitments of each at a more fundamental level.


Negotiation is much more than a game. Very often, serious interests and identity concerns are at stake, especially when the powerless must hold their own against those who have the upper hand. At RGI, we take needs and vulnerabilities very seriously, and our approach to conflict resolution seeks first of all to do that justice.

At the same time, negotiations and even existential conflict should always have their lighter side as well. As Shakespeare has taught us, life is a stage and we are all actors on it. From game theory we learn that virtually all human interactions can be understood (modelled) as a game: human beings acting out roles in concert or in contest with one another. As participants “play” with one another in this fashion, negotiating rules as they go, creative potential can be unleashed, and these games are “rational” if we can somehow make sense of why people behave in them as they do.

But not all games need be strategic, and not all rational thinking transpires the way that game theory assumes. We view rationality as a much larger and “messier” concept than commonly supposed. And we think it is best observed in games that are more than merely strategic: we aim to help negotiators and mediators engage in rational communicative games.

#### **Areas of support:**

What we have learned:

- 
1. Truly rational behaviour is not only purposeful, but expressive of identity, and thus sometimes best accessed through play.
  2. Language is, of course, our main tool for communication, but if we want to relate effectively our negotiation partners, we must also learn to understand emotions, body language and signalling. Words do not convey the entire picture.
  3. Negotiation results cannot be predicted in advance, but emerge freely from discussions. People are free agents who learn from one another, not automatons.
  4. The best results are those that manage to maximize both the value of a deal and the share of that deal that each party brings home. These goals do not have to be in conflict with one another.
  5. We believe that these skills can be learned: there are proven techniques to engage in open conversation and to bring about a fundamental change in the rules of most negotiation games.

## 1205. Reaching the “Moveable Middle”

### General goals:

In many European countries, the promise of significant progress on LGBTI rights and sexual reproductive rights (SRR) coexists with considerable threats and attacks on these very same rights. As historically marginalized groups become more visible and increasingly demand equality, it has simultaneously generated a public backlash against these groups. Such negative public sentiment has been effectively exploited and oftentimes led by those strongly opposed to international human rights standards. While it was initially thought that integration into the European Union would translate into sustained support for human rights values in all EU countries, this has not been the reality. Increasingly, European human rights defenders and civil society claim that as activists they need to be prepared to meet these new challenges and opportunities using innovative messages and mobilization techniques. Accordingly, the goals of this call for proposals are the following:

1. Reach the “moveable middle,” i.e., those who are natural human rights allies but who are not actively engaged on issues related to LGBTI or SRR.
2. Reach out to “unusual allies” and “unusual suspects,” i.e., those opinion leaders who may not be naturally sympathetic to these rights but who may be persuaded by the right messages and messengers.
3. Develop innovative methodologies, strategies, and tactics to mobilize and build the strength of the human rights movement, specifically the LGBTI and SRR constituencies.


The call for proposals is based on findings that emerged from a comprehensive needs assessment conducted with LGBTI and SRR activists in Europe. This is a multi-donor initiative being jointly supported by the

Open Society Initiative for Europe, the Open Society Human Rights Initiative, and the Arcus Foundation.

### Areas of support:

We invite both targeted projects aiming to respond to a particular threat and those proactively seeking to build on more general opportunities for further progress. Projects that rely on innovative methodologies and social media campaigning tools are highly encouraged. These may include, but are not limited to, the following types of projects:

- Research and advocacy projects, where the objective is to understand the opinion, values and beliefs of a particular group of people—e.g., allies, the opposition, decision-makers, those who are directly affected by the threat or opportunity—about the particular issue, based on which concrete advocacy or campaigning efforts can be designed.

- 
- Campaigning and mobilization projects, where the objective is to reach out to a particular group of people—allies, supporters and those who are directly affected by the threat or opportunity—and mobilize them in innovative ways, or on a much larger scale than previous efforts, to take action to counter the arguments and mobilization efforts of conservative religious or other right-wing movements. Projects that expose the corruption and hypocrisy of the opposition, public awareness–raising campaigns, social media campaigns, etc., can be included, as long as they have well-defined outputs.
  - Engaging in dialogue with religious actors, opinion leaders other key stakeholders, where the objective is to build contacts and alliances with faith communities and others interested in supporting equality. This can include efforts to raise the visibility of LGBTI or SRR leaders who are active in their faith communities and can help shift the narrative on these issues. A range of activities, from efforts for mutual sensitization to supporting the voices of progressive faith leaders, can be included, as long as the project has a clear output.
  - Capacity-building needs of NGOs in any of the above-mentioned fields may be incorporated into the actual projects, including exchanges, consultancies, trainings/ workshops, coaching or other tools. Although standalone capacity-building projects are not encouraged, in exceptional cases those will be considered, for which justification as to the urgent need to tackle skill gaps as a separate project, will be required.

Joint projects that build solidarity networks between LGBTI rights and reproductive rights advocates are welcome. Although cross-movement collaboration is not a precondition, applicants are encouraged to consider whether collaboration may be beneficial.

Projects that focus on a particular threat or opportunity in a given country will be prioritized; nevertheless multi-country projects with a clear justification for the need to engage in multiple locations will be considered.

**1212. Renovabis**

**General goals:**

Renovabis is the solidarity initiative of the German Catholics with the people in Central and Eastern

Europe. Renovabis was founded in March 1993 by the German Bishops' Conference at the suggestion of the

Central Committee of the German Catholics. The initiative supports its partners in the pastoral, social and societal renewal of the formerly communist countries of Central, Eastern and South-Eastern Europe. In the statutes of Renovabis it is among other things stipulated that: "It is the purpose of the association to further the pastoral objects in Central and Eastern Europe and the societal reconstruction in these regions, which the overall population shall benefit from, as well as to support people in need of help, regardless of their nationality and religious affiliation." (Art. 2) The project sponsorship of Renovabis follows a holistic approach encompassing both churchly and social projects. During the past years, an ever increasing number of educational projects were added. This clearly shows that those projects are prioritized which offer a direct benefit for the people, or to put it differently:

In the light of scarcity of means, investment in the wellbeing of the people takes priority over investment in the material infrastructure. The spectrum of projects is conceivably broad. Within the framework of the necessary social and societal renewal Renovabis is for example supporting the work with children and adolescents, for instance by establishing kindergartens and schools or by supporting

international youth meetings. Furthermore, assistance is given to soup kitchens, shelters for homeless persons, homes for orphans and assistance for handicapped persons. The organization of socio-political and economic-political seminars to impart the Christian social teaching and to further democratic awareness is – among the training of priests and laymen for the service in parishes – a further element of the assistance given.

**1220. Right to Education in Inclusive Settings**

**General goals:**

The Open Society Foundations' Education Support Program and Human Rights Initiative are soliciting proposals from organizations working to promote the right to education in inclusive settings. We define

inclusive education as an approach to education that recognizes all children as valued members of a community. We seek to address obstacles to children's participation in education resulting from majority attitudes toward disability, race and ethnicity, minority or citizenship status, minority language and culture, gender, religious affiliation, sexual orientation, or social or economic disadvantage.

**Areas of support:**

The Open Society Foundations' Education Support Program (ESP) and Human Rights Initiative (HRI) are soliciting proposals from organizations working to promote the right to education in inclusive settings.

The purpose of this call is to amplify the voice of civil society organizations engaging with treaty bodies reviewing the commitment of State parties to the right to education in 2016. These treaty bodies include the Committee of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD), the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC), the Convention on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (CESCR), and the

Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW). Proposals may respond to one of the following areas of opportunity:

1. The CRPD Committee is developing a General Comment on Article 24, the right to education. This process will continue through the first part of 2016. Applicants may propose projects or initiatives to participate in the development of this general comment as local, national or regional representative(s) of civil society. Submissions or presentations to the CRPD Committee that provide strong recommendations based on local experience are likely to strengthen the general comment. Applicants may also propose submissions related to the planned general comment on Article 19 of the CRPD that address the intersection between the right to education and the right to live in the community.
2. The CEDAW Committee will begin developing a General Recommendation on girls'/women's right to education, the purpose of which "is to provide appropriate and authoritative guidance to States parties to the Convention on the measures to be adopted with a view to ensuring full compliance with their obligations under article 10 of the Convention to respect, protect and fulfil the right of women and girls to education." Applicants may propose projects or initiatives to participate in the development of this general recommendation as local, national or regional representative(s) of civil society. Proposals should explicitly address the intersection of girls'/women's right to education with other factors of exclusion, such as disability or minority status, through an inclusive education lens.
3. Each year, the CRPD Committee requests reports from States parties on the implementation of obligations under the CRPD. Organizations that are developing substantive contributions to alternative or parallel reports specifically addressing the right to education in inclusive settings from countries that will be reviewed by the CRPD Committee in 2016 are invited to submit proposals requesting funding/support for those reports.

4. Organizations making contributions to parallel or alternative reports to other Committees, including the CRC, CESCR, and CEDAW are invited to submit proposals if they will specifically address the issue of inclusion in education for any group facing discrimination. Preference will be given to constituency-led organizations or consortia of organizations addressing the intersection of discrimination in education for different groups.

Our selection of cooperation countries are based on political decisions made by the Swedish government. Sida's mission is to allocate aid and other funding. Our operations are managed by the government's guidelines, describing the goals for each year's operations and the size of the development aid budget. Our staff members and their expertise assist the government with the assessments and the information it needs, in order to decide and implement its development assistance policy. We participate in the advocacy work for Sweden has prioritized issues within the international development cooperation field, and we are in constant dialogue with other countries and international organizations. Part of our assignment is also to report statistics and disseminate information about our operations.

Our work is financed by tax money and we administer approximately half of Sweden's total development aid budget. The other part is channeled through the ministry for Foreign Affairs. All our work should be performed in a cost-effective way with a strong focus on results.

**Areas of support:**

Swedish development cooperation helps reduce poverty in the world. Our support contributes to economic and political development in poor countries. This strengthens their democracy and creates conditions for people to lift themselves out of poverty. The objective of Swedish development cooperation is to create opportunities for people living in poverty and under oppression to improve their living conditions. Everyone living in Sweden and paying taxes is contributing to this. The government decides about how much money is allocated to development in the annual budget. It has long been about one per cent of Sweden's GDP. The Swedish state authority for development cooperation, Sida, has the power to decide about a half of the Swedish aid budget and is subject to the Swedish Ministry for Foreign Affairs. Aid is both about humanitarian aid (emergency relief) and long-term development cooperation. Cooperation is the more comprehensive of the two, although emergency interventions are perhaps the most visible. Creating income opportunities: With help of aid, poor countries get opportunities to build up their economy and develop their trade and industry. This leads, for example, to export incomes for those countries and job opportunities for their residents. Sweden promotes the removal of trade barriers that currently prevent poor countries from gaining access to the world market.

Strengthening democracy: As poor countries develop their economies, the risk of conflicts reduces, and at the same time, democracy develops. When people get political rights, they can participate in and influence social development.

On beneficiaries' terms: It is important that development assistance is conducted on terms of those who are to benefit from it. Since the 90s, we rather use the concepts of development cooperation and

partner countries – as the projects and programmes are designed precisely in collaboration with partner countries and local partner organizations. For development to be sustainable in the long-term, it is essential that the ownership of the projects be in their hands.

## **General goals:**

The Jack Kimmel International Grant Program makes grants to researchers in arboriculture and urban forestry worldwide. The Jack Kimmel International Grant Program, championed by the Canadian TREE Fund, honors the late Jack Kimmel who was the former Director of Parks for the City of Toronto. He is remembered for his contribution of 46 years of leadership to the ISA and its Ontario chapter. Jack Kimmel grants provide much needed funding to arboriculture and urban forestry researchers all over the world. This grant is administered by the TREE Fund, with participation from the Canadian TREE Fund in the evaluation process.

## **Areas of support:**

The TREE Fund research priority areas are derived from the Revised National Research and Technology Transfer Agenda for Urban and Community Forestry. Proposals in the following priority areas are more likely to be funded, but all proposals will be considered.

- **Root and soil management:** Many urban tree problems originate below ground. Promoting root development, protecting roots from injury and managing conflicts with infrastructure are issues that arborists encounter regularly. Managing roots includes soil management.
- **Propagation, planting and establishment:** Methods of ensuring survival and vigorous growth of trees after planting are of concern to arborists and the entire green industry. Arborists are increasingly dealing with problems that originate in, or could be avoided during the planting process.
- **Plant health care:** Healthy plants have more effective defense systems and are better able to resist pests. Complete understanding of plant health may lead to new pest control strategies.
- **Risk assessment and worker safety:** Safety is a major concern. It can be a life-or-death issue to both tree workers and the public. Detection of defects, and knowing how they develop, are important. Improved equipment and work practices are needed.
- **Urban forestry:** Management of urban trees and forests requires improved understanding of how urban forest ecosystems function, their management, and how they interact with people in communities and at the urban/rural interface.

- **Funding:** Is there a clear explanation of how funds will be used in the context of the total project budget? Are additional sources of funding for the project being pursued? Is the potential cost/benefit ratio for this project appropriate?



1426. **TRUST FOR CIVIL SOCIETY IN CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE (CEE TRUST)**

The CEE Trust exists to support people and organizations in Central and Eastern European countries to take strategic steps with long-term benefits, toward three mutually reinforcing and intersecting objectives:

- To create a supportive environment for civil society, this includes legal, fiscal and political environments favorable to a strong civic life;
- To strengthen the nonprofit sector through capacity building, advocacy, intrasector, and cross-sectoral cooperation and partnership;
- To enhance the financial sustainability of nonprofit organizations by developing public and private sources of support for the nonprofit sector and by supporting the operational and strategic development of nonprofit organizations.

- CEE regional advocacy, watchdog, and public policy initiatives or networks;
- CEE regional networking and information exchange initiatives or organizations (context in which CEE civil society functions);
- CEE regional cross-border grant makers;
- CEE regional initiatives linking civil society actors with policymakers and public authorities (local, regional, national, and EU levels).

A maximum grant amount has been set for up to US\$25,000. CEE Trust is flexible in regard to the size and duration of grants when an exception is justified. Supported initiatives would preferably include significant co-funding from other sources.

**Fellowship Opportunities:** The CEE Trust provides a limited number of individual fellowships aimed at developing leadership capacities of NGOs and foundations in the region. Currently there are two fellowship opportunities:

1. Individual grants for young leaders as well as senior managers and executives under the International Fellowship Program (IFP) managed by the European Foundation Center on a competition basis within an open call for applications. Such persons are given the opportunity to work from three to 12 weeks in another organization throughout Europe to gain valuable insights and experiences.
2. Individual support is available to individuals for participating in big civil society events, conferences, seminars, or workshops upon request. The individuals should be invited as speakers, moderators, or active participants in discussions. The applicants must submit their motivation letter, the relevant agenda, and their request for funding to the CEE Trust at least one month prior to the event.

**Introduction**

The Third World Organization for Women in Science (TWOWS) is an independent, non-profit and non-governmental body, based at the offices of the Academy of Sciences for the Developing World (TWAS) in Trieste, Italy.

The idea of setting up a Third-World organization for women in science was first discussed at the "Conference on the Role of Women in the Development of Science and Technology in the Third World", which was convened by TWAS and the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), in Trieste from 3 to 7 October 1988. The participants of the conference including 218 leading women scientists from 63 developing countries recommended that a study group be set up to explore the possibility of creating the organization. The group was subsequently formed and, at its meeting in Trieste from 20 to 22 March 1989, it decided to establish the Third-World Organization for Women in Science and to adopt a constitution for the organization.

TWOWS is the first international forum to unite eminent women scientists from the South with the objective of strengthening their role in the development process and promoting their representation in scientific and technological leadership.

Full Membership is open to women scientists and scientific institutions in the South. Currently there are 2,120 full individual and 29 full institutional members in 87 developing countries. Associate Membership comprises institutions and individuals (male and female) from both the North and the South, not responding to the criteria for full membership but committed to the objectives of the Organization. At present, 329 individuals and 57 institutions in 52 countries in the South and 27 countries in the North are associate members. In addition, Candidate Membership is open to young women from the South who have not yet earned their first degree in science and technology.

### **Objectives**

- To strengthen research efforts and training opportunities for young women scientists working and living in Third-World countries
- To survey and analyze the status and prospects of women in science and technology in the Third World
- To promote the recognition of the scientific and technological achievements of women
- To improve the access to educational and training opportunities for women in science and technology
- To increase the scientific productivity and efficiency of women-scientists in the Third World

- To promote collaboration and communication among women-scientists and technologists in the Third World and with the international scientific community, as a whole
- To promote their participation in the decision-making processes, both at national and international levels
- To encourage other international organizations to increase their activities concerned with promoting the role of women in science and technology in the Third World

For the most part, youth remains an “invisible” category, but are among the beneficiaries of larger programs (MDGs, UNAIDS) and a variety

of country programs. Only some UN agencies have specific programs targeting youth and children (e.g., UNICEF and UNFPA) and these may differ from country to country. Where a country

Office has put in place a UN Theme Group on Youth, youth can gain more visibility. One highlight for Africa as a good practice in the field of youth in the UN system is Botswana, which has a UN Theme Group on HIV/AIDS and Youth Sexual and Reproductive Health.

#### 1473. THE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE AND THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION IN THE FIELD OF YOUTH

Since 1998, the (sections responsible for youth in the) Council of Europe and the European Commission have cooperated closely in the youth field. This 155 2.3 Europe

partnership has taken the form of consecutive agreements focusing in the first stage on “European Youth Worker and Youth Leader Training,” complemented in 2003 by two further covenants, one on “Euro-Mediterranean Youth Cooperation” and another on “Youth Research.” As of 2005 both partners

(CoE and EC) strengthened cooperation and established a single partnership agreement with the aim of providing a lasting framework for the joint development of a coherent strategy in the field of youth worker training, youth policy, and youth research in Europe. The partnership has activities in the areas of youth research, youth policy development, and Euro–Med youth cooperation with the aim of providing added value to the programs of the two institutions and their institutional partners, fostering cooperation, complementarity and synergies, and enhancing the partnership’s impact on youth-related policies and activities in Europe and beyond. The partnership does not have a grant-making mechanism. It has ten members of staff, but a relatively limited operational budget considering the scope of the program (figures not available in the public domain). It nevertheless provides important complementary support to the development of the European youth sector and its professionalization through its operational training, research, and policy activities.

The [United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change](#) (UNFCCC) is an international environmental treaty developed at the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development in Rio de Janeiro in 1992 (the “Earth Summit”).

The resulting [Kyoto Protocol](#) was accepted by most of the world’s countries as a legally binding measure to stabilize atmospheric greenhouse gases at a level that will prevent human-caused interference with the world’s climate system.

The UNFCCC uses the Adaptation Fund to make grants for projects and programs in developing countries that are Parties to the Kyoto Protocol.

Grant Programs for Agriculture, Energy, Environment, Natural Resources

**Adaptation Fund.** The Adaptation Fund makes grants for projects and programs that address the adverse impacts of, and risks posed by, climate change. Themes include measures to increase resilience against the threats of droughts, flooding, coastal erosion, etc., and the negative impacts they cause for agriculture, fisheries, water supply, and related aspects of community livelihoods.

Eligibility for grants extends to countries which are Parties to the Kyoto Protocol, with emphasis on developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change. Grants are primarily to government organizations such as national ministries, development institutes, local government authorities, and others – sometimes in partnership with civil society organizations.





**1500. United Nations Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture**

**General goals:**

The UN Voluntary Fund for Victims of Torture is a unique and universal humanitarian tool available to the UN and OHCHR providing direct assistance to victims of torture and their family members wherever

torture occurs. The Fund aims at healing the physical and psychological consequences of torture on victims and their families, and thus restoring their dignity and role in the society.

**Areas of support:**

Direct humanitarian assistance is provided in the following fields: Medical assistance, includes, residential treatment, referrals to specialists and mobile health clinics. The medical assistance treats the physical after-effects of torture. Following diagnosis by a general practitioner, medical specialists in the fields of orthopedics, neurology, physiotherapy, pediatrics, sexual health, urology as well as traditional healing and complementary medicine provide treatment. Psychological assistance, includes, individual, couple, group and family therapy counselling, art therapy (theatre, painting, sculpture), occupational therapy, meditation/acupuncture and other culturally sensitive and appropriate techniques, psychological support in preparation for attendance to trials. Psychological assistance is provided to enable victims of torture to overcome the psychological trauma they have experienced. Individual therapy, whether based on clinical, psychoanalytical, behavioural or other therapy, seeks to assist victims with their gradual reintegration into society. Psychiatric therapy may be combined with medication to alleviate physical and psychological symptoms.

Social assistance, includes, vocational training, material assistance for basic needs, such as accommodation, food, clothes and utilities, etc. on the basis of needs and vulnerability. Organisations are required to establish a transparent mechanism for the provision of social assistance and effective monitoring procedures. Legal assistance may be provided in a number of ways. For torture victims seeking asylum, legal assistance can be crucial in the preparation and follow-up of asylum applications in a host country. The Fund also contributes to combating impunity. Grants are used to seek reparation and compensation for victims through claims before competent national, regional and international bodies.

Financial assistance enables victims to meet their basic needs and to gain access to other types of assistance, such as health care. In some cases, nominal assistance is distributed to unemployed victims, particularly when they are unable to work as a result of the serious physical and psychological effects of torture. Financial assistance may also be used to offset the costs of educating their children.

The UN General Assembly resolution establishing the Fund, 35/151, mandated it to distribute voluntary contributions to victims of torture through “established channels of assistance”. The Board of Trustees of the Fund has, over the years and in practice, accepted applications from a variety of channels of

assistance, including, inter alia, non-governmental organizations, associations of victims of torture and/or their family members, public and private hospitals and clinics, public interest law firms and individual lawyers, legal aid clinics and grass-root and community based organizations.

Applications by governmental, parliamentary or administrative entities, political parties or national liberation movements are inadmissible.

**Size of grant:**

The Fund awards annual grants averaging US\$30,000 - 40,000 to a variety of civil society projects that provide medical, psychological, social and legal assistance to victims of torture.

**1503. UN Trust Fund to End Violence against Women**

**General goals:**

The UN Trust Fund to End Violence against Women (UN Trust Fund) awards grants to initiatives that demonstrate that violence against women and girls can be systematically addressed, reduced and, with persistence, eliminated.

Since its creation in 1996, the UN Trust Fund has awarded USD 116 million to 426 initiatives in 136 countries and territories. Its current portfolio comprises 111 grants totalling USD 57 million in 76 countries and territories.

Established by UN General Assembly resolution 50/166 and administered by UN Women on behalf of the UN System, the UN Trust Fund works with non-governmental organizations (NGOs), governments and

UN country teams to:

An organization’s track record of implementing projects and programmes focused on the elimination of violence against women and girls, sexual and gender based violence, as well as demonstrated capacity and expertise in these fields will be considered an asset.

The UN Trust Fund promotes initiatives based on the following principles:

- Human rights-based and gender-responsive approaches that place paramount priority on promoting, protecting and fulfilling the human rights of all women and girls, as well as strengthening institutional capacities at local and national levels to eliminate all forms of violence against women and girls.
- Focus on impact, specific and measurable results which make a concrete difference in lives of women and girls.
- Holistic and multi-sectoral responses that address women and girl’s inter-related rights and needs in terms of prevention and response to violence, including safety and protection, access to health, legal, property and inheritance rights, and economic security and rights.
- Focus on underserved groups, especially excluded or disadvantaged women and girls (such as women and girls with disabilities, LBT, internally displaced and refugees, indigenous, older and members of ethnic minorities), ensuring responsiveness to diversity.
- Coordination and partnership-building, including among government entities, civil society organizations, especially women-led and small organization, women’s specialist service providers and EVAW thematic networks.

- Commitment to sharing knowledge, by documenting, monitoring, evaluating and disseminating results.
- Evidence-based programming, building on documented research, lessons learned and recommended practices, to ensure optimal results and use of resources.

**1504. United Nations Voluntary Fund on Contemporary  
Forms of Slavery**

**General goals:**

The Fund assists individuals, whose human rights have been severely violated as a result of modern slavery. It provides direct humanitarian, legal and financial assistance to victims through grants awarded to non-governmental organisations.

Since its establishment by the General Assembly in 1991 (resolution 46/122), the Slavery Fund has supported more than 400 organizations in 95 countries, providing rehabilitation and assistance to thousands of victims

**Areas of support:**

Setting slaves free is only the first step on a long journey towards their full and integral rehabilitation. Rebuilding the lives of victims means empowering them, helping them to find their own abilities and strengths and foster resilience before they can start a new life. The process of assisting victims to live in freedom includes: providing a protective environment; assisting victims to overcome the psychological trauma they have experienced; providing various services (e.g. housing, healthcare) to reduce the sense of marginalization and stigma that many victims experience; providing legal representation to victims; providing and/or facilitating access to education, vocational training and sustainable sources of income (e.g. financial assistance and employment opportunities), thus giving them the tools to avoid re-victimization.

With the support of the Fund, organizations have developed ground-breaking projects to assist child soldiers and victims of sexual slavery in armed conflicts, they provided legal assistance to victims of bonded and forced labor rescued from ranches, health care, food and education to children working in quarries and carpet industries, offered emergency shelters, free hotlines, primary health care and legal assistance to victims of forced marriages, domestic servitude and trafficking.

Psycho-social assistance is provided to enable victims to overcome the psychological trauma they have experienced. Individual therapy assists victims with their gradual reintegration into society. Social assistance complements the psycho-social assistance and ensures that victims have access to basic services, including housing, health care, education, language classes and employment training.

Medical assistance treats the physical post-traumatic effects that victims experienced. Following diagnosis by a medical professional, conventional treatment is provided as well as traditional healing and complementary medicine.

Educational assistance and vocational training enable victims and their children to be reintegrated in society, offering them tools to avoid become victims again. Educational assistance is offered in different forms. Non formal education serves the purpose of bridging the educational gap of those who have been prevented from attending school as a cause and consequence of slavery. Formal education is provided by means of enrolling children in State's run schools, paying for school fees, as well as providing uniforms, meals and stationery.

Vocational training enhances the chances of victims being reintegrated into employment schemes. Legal assistance may be provided in a number of ways including covering the costs of lawyers, courts,

translations and legal proceedings. The Fund also contributes to combating impunity where grants are used to seek reparation and compensation for victims before competent national, regional and international bodies.

Financial assistance enables victims to meet their basic needs and to gain access to other types of assistance, such as health care, for example. In some cases, nominal assistance is distributed to unemployed victims of contemporary forms of slavery, particularly when they are unable to work as a result of severe physical and psychological traumas they have endured.

Capacity building of grantees aims at strengthening the capacity of organizations receiving grants, by organizing skills-based training sessions, such as human rights education and project management training.



**1510. Urgent Action Fund for Women's Human Rights**

**General goals:**

Urgent Action Fund partners with women’s movements worldwide to support women’s human rights defenders striving to create cultures of justice, equality and peace. We are led by activists, rooted in feminism, and strengthened through solidarity. We believe that the best way to support activists seeking to effect systemic change is to adopt a flexible, adaptive grantmaking approach that supports the creativity and vision of grassroots leaders and a diversity of tactics. This is because grassroots activists are constantly devising new methods for creating change. Flexible grantmaking allows activists to innovate and respond to unanticipated situations as they arise.

Within this flexible framework, what then are the ingredients of systemic change? First, we believe that grassroots leadership and community action are crucial. Urgent Action Fund supports long-term change efforts by supporting the vision, creativity, and agency of local activists – and not telling them what they should be doing.

Second, we believe that women have a unique contribution to make. The link between women and peacebuilding is well known but poorly supported. Women are often excluded from peace-building and post-conflict reconstruction processes. Urgent Action Fund supports women as agents of change in their communities. Third, it is critical to recognize that changing oppressive systems often results in violent backlash. Urgent Action Fund provides Protection & Security grants to women’s human rights activists.

Fourth, funders, politicians, and policymakers play an important role in systemic change. Therefore, Urgent Action Fund leverages the power we have as a funder to advocate on behalf of our grantees with larger foundations and in political and policy circles. And finally, we believe funders must see ourselves as part of movements for change, and hold ourselves accountable accordingly. Funders, then, have an opportunity to play a role in shifting the power dynamics between funder and grantee and between the global north and global south. This includes everything from how, where, and from whom we raise money, down to the daily interactions we have with activists and our donors. Urgent Action Fund trusts activists on the ground to identify effective strategies that we are committed to financially supporting and advocating for. Our values and concept of change are inextricably intertwined, and all of our programming flows from this source.

**Areas of support:**

Urgent Action Fund builds the resilience of women’s rights and LGBT rights movements in three ways:

- **Rapid Response Grantmaking:** We award rapid response grants to women and transgender human rights defenders in Asia, the Middle East, Central and Eastern Europe, and North America.
- **Advocacy & Alliance-Building:** We leverage the power we have as a funder to advocate for women and transgender human rights defenders.

- Global Consortium of Urgent Action Funds: We are one of three Urgent Action Funds. Together with our sister funds: Urgent Action Fund-Africa and Urgent Action Fund-Latin America, we collectively support women and girls' activism globally.

### **Application procedures:**

Urgent Action Fund was established to provide support to women and trans\* human rights defenders or organizations led by women or trans\* activists when an unexpected situation arises that requires an immediate and time-urgent response to uphold human rights. Urgent Action Fund's Rapid Response Grants complement traditional donor funding in cases of crises, emergencies, or opportunities that are not expected or predictable, and when funding is needed immediately to address the current situation.

Urgent Action Fund provides two types of Rapid Response Grants. To receive a Rapid Response Grant, your proposal must fall under at least one of these situations:

1. Security Grants – The safety and security of women or trans\* human rights defenders/activists/ organizations is threatened due to their human rights work.
2. Opportunity Grants – An unexpected moment or opportunity for advocacy or mobilization that may result in advancements for women's and LGBTQI's rights, such as changes in legal decisions, policy and laws, or a shift in public attitudes and practices in their local context.

### **Eligibility criteria:**

Grant proposals must fit four Criteria:

1. Women/Trans\*-led – women/trans\* people must be the primary decision-makers in the organization, group, or action.
2. Women or Trans\* Human Rights Focus – the actions proposed promote the advancement of women's or trans\* human rights using nonviolent tactics or strategies.
3. Unanticipated and Time Urgent – the specific event or situation your organization is responding to was unanticipated, and actions must happen quickly to be effective. Actions must be implemented within 3 months of approval of an application.

**1511. USAID's Marginalized Populations Support Program**

**General goals:**

USAID's Marginalized Populations Support Program supports activities of local organizations that advocate for the rights, empowerment and dignity of underrepresented groups of BiH society, and builds the capacity of local NGOs, BiH institutions and USAID implementing partners to do so. Providing underrepresented groups with opportunities to participate in civic and political issues, through their engagement in civil society organizations, will ensure that the government recognizes them as necessary and respectable partners in policy development.

**Areas of support:**

The Institute for Youth Development KULT and NGO and Business Audit d.o.o. Sarajevo will manage USAID's support to local groups that represent the interests of marginalized populations through the following three activity performance areas:

- Provide grants to organizations that advocate for the rights and dignity of underrepresented groups. These include youth, women, disabled persons, the Roma and LGBT communities.

- Build the programmatic and financial management capacity of grantees and other local organizations, institutions, and USAID government partners that are promoting the rights and needs of marginalized populations.

- Provide humanitarian and/or material assistance to promote the dignity and welfare of marginalized groups during unanticipated events such as disasters.

To be eligible to become a sector partner, potential applicants must meet the following eligibility criteria:

- Applicants must be registered as nonprofit legal entities under the valid Law on Associations and/or Foundations at any BiH level, and be public service oriented;
- The applicant must have the necessary skills, reputation and experience to conduct proposed activities;
- That the applicant is not bankrupt, dissolving, or has its business activities suspended, or has/had affairs administrated by the courts;
- Applicants must not engage in transactions with, or provide resources or support to, individuals and organizations associated with terrorism.
- Demonstrated capacity of organization, including sound financial practice, in areas pertaining to the proposed activity;
- Capability of responsiveness to need;
- Potential for impact that facilitates the inclusion of marginalized populations in civic and political decision-making in Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH);
- Likelihood of proposed activity to further project objectives; and
- Appropriateness and feasibility of project activities within the proposed timeframe and budget.

Individuals, political parties, foreign organizations, government institutions, organizations primarily engaged in religious activities are not eligible for grants under PPMG.

Bosnia and Herzegovina.

**Size of grant:**

Various, based on calls for proposals.

**Application deadline:**

Calls for proposals for various components are opened throughout the year.



**1512. THE UN PROGRAM ON YOUTH**

The UN Program on Youth was established to:

- enhance awareness of the global situation of youth and increase recognition of the rights and aspirations of youth;
- promote national youth policies, national youth coordinating mechanisms and national youth programs of action as integral parts of social and economic development, in cooperation with both governmental and nongovernmental organizations; and
- strengthen the participation of youth in decision-making processes at all levels in order to increase their impact on national development and international cooperation.

Its main responsibilities include:

- The publication of the World Youth Report;
- The preparation of activities to celebrate International Youth Day every year;

- The monitoring of progress toward and support for efforts to implement the WPAY;
- consulting and advising other UN units on youth issues;
- Assistance to governments preparing youth ministerial conferences (i.e., participation in proposed steering groups, and the like);
- The organization of occasional events, conferences and forums.

UN Program on Youth has no direct grant-making activities. No information is available in the public domain concerning its operational budget. Its activities are funded from the general budget of the UN through the division in which it is located, e.g., the Department for Social and Economic Affairs, which has four professional and one general member of staff.

- **AoC Youth Solidarity Fund**

The AoC has launched a Youth Solidarity Fund, which provides seed funding in amounts up to US\$20,000 to a small number of outstanding youth-led projects in the fields of intercultural and inter-religious exchange, youth leadership training, and youth voices in the media. Projects must have long-term goals that help youth from disenfranchised communities to overcome perceived or real cultural and religious divides, and must be entirely managed by young people for the benefit of young people. The aim of this competitive funding mechanism is to facilitate genuine bridge-building among young people of different cultural and religious backgrounds.

The Youth Solidarity Fund provides funding for projects that are entirely managed by young people for the benefit of young people between the ages of 18 and 35. To be eligible, applicants must:

- be membership-based youth organizations (youth-led or primarily youth-serving) or a network composed of several youth-led organizations;
- be nongovernmental organizations (with the exception of national youth councils) registered in the country of operation as a charity, trust, foundation, or association, that have funded and implemented projects for a minimum of one year;
- have a democratic governance structure that nominates leaders and implements formal priorities and member policies;
- demonstrate proper and consistent record-keeping of its activities, including minutes and accounts;
- monitor, evaluate, and assess the impact of activities and projects;
- reflect gender perspective and balance in staff and membership;
- not adhere to or have affiliations with violent ideologies or antagonism against any particular country, religion, ethnic group, color, or sex.

1519. **UN HUMAN SETTLEMENTS PROGRAM (UN-HABITAT)**

UN-HABITAT is the UN agency for human settlements. Mandated by the UN General Assembly, it promotes socially and environmentally sustainable towns and cities that provide adequate shelter for all. UN-HABITAT recognizes young people as active participants in the future of human settlements. UN-HABITAT initiates and fosters interagency partnerships with youth organizations. It engages young people at an international level to help formulate an international understanding of pressing youth issues. Working with young men and women and understanding their diverse abilities, realities, and experiences is an essential element of UN-HABITAT's long-term success of achieving sustainable urbanization. Young people need acknowledgment, guidance, resources, and training in order to reach their full potential. UN-HABITAT has a Youth Strategy for Enhanced Engagement, an integrated approach to urban youth development that guides the operations of the agency when working with young people. This strategy provides a road map for the promotion of urban youth empowerment.

#### 1520. **UN-HABITAT: Opportunities Fund for Youth-Led Development**

The Opportunities Fund for Youth-Led Development was officially established by the UN-HABITAT Governing Council (GC resolution 21/6) in 2007, in direct response to requests from youth, including those attending the Third World Urban Forum (Vancouver, 2006). Championed by Norway, this fund has US\$1 million to spend annually in support of initiatives promoting youth leadership in sustainable urban development. The aim of the fund is to promote leadership and participation of young women and men in achieving sustainable urbanization. The fund bridges the policy-practice divide by promoting model youth-led projects that demonstrate the global community's commitment to youth, and Governments agreed that a new fund to expand the agency's youth programs would be created to:

- strengthen youth-related policy formulation;
- build the capacities of governments, civil society organizations, and the private sector to better address youth concerns, and support new information and communication for young people;
- test new approaches to employment, good governance, adequate shelter, and secure tenure, and promote the sharing of best practices;
- promote vocational training and credit mechanisms to encourage entrepreneurship and employment for young women and men, in collaboration with the private sector and with other UN bodies.

### **1521. UNITED NATIONS EDUCATIONAL, SCIENTIFIC AND CULTURAL ORGANIZATION (UNESCO)**

UNESCO's objective is to empower young people by reaching out to them, responding to their expectations and ideas, and fostering useful and long-lasting skills. UNESCO encourages the participation of youth and their engagement in dialogue. It also supports the integration of youth concerns and issues into the policy agendas of member states in education, the sciences, culture, and communication in order to create spaces and opportunities for empowering young people and giving recognition, visibility, and credibility to their contributions. UNESCO's youth program focuses on interagency cooperation, cooperation with NGOs, youth forum(s), and youth policies and programs. UNESCO does not offer grants for youth-related initiatives, although it has an elaborate operational program that organizes training, convening, and youth policy-related activities. From 1999, UNESCO operated a small grants facility for young people and youth organizations to conduct projects related to HIV/AIDS, but it appears to have been discontinued. If an international nongovernmental organization (INGO) active in the field of youth has operational relations with UNESCO, it may request assistance for specific activities from UNESCO's Participation Program.

#### ➤ **UNESCO's Participation Program**

The Participation Program enables member states to carry out important projects, particularly in the organization's main areas of competence. Through this program UNESCO aims to:

- achieve its objectives by participating in the sub regional, inter-regional, and regional projects, led by its member states and directly related to the activities of the organization;

- strengthen the partnership between the organization and its member states as well as between the organization and INGOs;
- boost the actions of the national commissions for UNESCO;
- achieve better visibility of UNESCO's action in its member states.

The Participation Program helps to invigorate the action of the national commissions for UNESCO, release creative energies in a number of fields, and mobilize efforts in pursuing and implementing projects of current interest. Projects and action plans may be submitted by member states, by several member states from one region (for regional projects), or by INGOs that have formal or operational relations with UNESCO (the list of eligible INGOs is established by UNESCO's executive committee). Proposals must relate to UNESCO's major programs, its interdisciplinary projects, its activities on behalf of Africa, the least-developed countries, youth and women, or the activities of the national commissions for UNESCO.

The different types of assistance that can be requested under the Participation Program are:

- Specialists and consultants, not including staff costs;
- Study grants and fellowships;
- Publications, periodicals, documentation, translation, and reproduction;
- Supplies and equipment (other than vehicles);
- Conferences, meetings, translation, and interpretation services, participants' travel costs (not including those of UNESCO staff members);
- Seminars and training courses.

## 1522. UNITED NATIONS CHILDREN'S FUND (UNICEF)

UNICEF is mandated by the UN General Assembly to advocate for the protection of children's rights, to help meet their basic needs, and to expand their opportunities to reach their full potential under the guidance of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. It strives to establish children's rights as enduring ethical principles and international standards of behavior by mobilizing political will and resources. UNICEF recognizes that young people are speaking out and taking active leadership roles throughout society. UNICEF works with and for adolescents to promote their rights to meaningful participation and positive development. Officially, UNICEF works with young people up to age 18, but many of its projects also work with older young people. At the international level, UNICEF does not conduct grant-making activities. However, it has several large-scale operational programs that support youth development and youth participation in development.

### **The Junior 8 Summits (J8)**

UNICEF organizes the J8 Summits each year in conjunction with G8 Summits. Young people take part in workshops, roundtable discussions, and participatory exercises to help them grapple with and agree on the priority issues and recommendations on the G8 agenda. At the end of their dis

cussions, the J8 delegates write a report outlining their conclusions and recommendations, which is presented to the G8 leaders in a face-to-face dialogue. Topics in the J8 agenda have included education, HIV/AIDS, climate change, development in Africa, tolerance, and global health. Participants to the J8 Summit include teams of young people representing the G8 countries as well as a delegation of young people from non-G8 countries representing the various regions of the world. Each year, the details of the Junior 8 Summit are determined by the G8 host government collaborating with UNICEF.

### **Voices of Youth (VoY)**

Since 1995, the VoY website has focused on exploring the educational and community-building potential of the Internet, and facilitating the active and substantive participation of young people in discussions on child rights and development-related issues. Through web boards, interactive quizzes, youth leadership profiles, live chats and more, VoY provides thousands of young people from over 180 countries with an opportunity to self-inform, engage in lively debate, and partner with their peers and decision makers, in particular in relation of HIV/AIDS and the themes of the WPAY.

**Focus on HIV/AIDS:** UNICEF is very active in the area of children and adolescents and HIV/AIDS. In close collaboration with partners, UNICEF provides support to scale up efforts to prevent mother-to-child transmission of HIV; promote pediatric HIV diagnosis and treatment, as well as the protection, care, and support for children affected by AIDS; and prevent HIV transmission in adolescents in over 100 countries.

**Other themes:** UNICEF's activities span most areas of the WPAY, including education, the environment, substance use, justice for children and adolescents, girls and young women, and armed conflict.

### **1523. UNITED KINGDOM DEPARTMENT FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (DFID)**

The DFID was established in 1997 as a part of the UK government to manage Britain's aid to poor countries and overcome extreme poverty. DFID works in 150 countries and had, in 2007–8, a budget of US\$8.7 billion. Well over half the aid goes to developing countries either directly or through an international body. Almost a third of the UK's aid goes to international bodies for their own development activities, such as health care, education, and economic growth. DFID also works with over 200 international and UK civil society organizations and has direct or indirect links with thousands of civil society organizations in developing countries. Funding to civil society has increased by 84% since 1997.

**Social Exclusion:** DFID works with partners to address the needs and rights of specific excluded groups, particularly disabled people, children, and youth. Projects aim to give disadvantaged and marginalized people a voice in decision making. Research is supported to learn about the economic impact of social

exclusion, its role in the relationship between growth, employment, and poverty, and disability. In Serbia, DFID has supported a government initiative to give some of the country's most disadvantaged people the chance of a better future. The UK-backed package of social welfare reforms includes a series of programs aimed at young adults without parents. In Bolivia, DFID support helped to establish Circo Infantil, an educational facility for children from poor families and indigenous groups to learn social and vocational skills.

**Health Education:** DFID's priority to improve health education and services provides young people with better sexual and reproductive health information, services, and supplies. In Rwanda, DFID works with the government to support youth education programs on HIV/AIDS. Across the country, youth centers offer young people a combination of leisure time activities and health education. DFID's investment in the Rwandan health education program is an annual US\$2.5 million.

**Gender Equality:** DFID is making gender equality a priority and focuses on everything from girls' education to microfinance, HIV and AIDS to conflict resolution, and maternal health to boosting the political participation of women. For example, DFID is contributing significantly to the European Commission's Northern Pakistan Education Program that provides aid to disadvantaged children and adults, particularly women. The organization established 368 literacy centers and advanced the literacy of tens of thousands of women. As a result, mothers were better able to assist their children with homework and became more actively involved in their children's school. An additional benefit of the literacy centers included instruction in fields such as human rights.

#### 1524. UNITED STATES AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (USAID)

USAID is an independent federal government agency that receives foreign policy guidance from the Secretary of State. Its history goes back to the Marshall Plan reconstruction of Europe after World War II and the Truman Administration's Point Four Program. In 1961, the Foreign Assistance Act was signed into law and USAID was created by executive order. Since that time, USAID has been the principal U.S. agency to extend assistance to countries recovering from disaster, trying to escape poverty, and engaging in democratic reforms. The agency works in 100 developing countries and in close partnership with private voluntary organizations, indigenous groups, universities, American

businesses, international organizations, other governments, trade and professional associations, faith-based organizations, and other U.S. government agencies. USAID projected budget for 2010 is US\$53.9 billion. The following are USAID's major programs for youth.

**Youth Development:** Within its priority on education, USAID has specific programming on youth development. It supports youth programs that address a diverse spectrum of youth needs and draws on technical expertise in education, health, democracy and governance, natural resource management, economic development, and agriculture. Specific activity areas include:

**Literacy for Out-of-School Youth:** USAID's Basic Education and EQUIP 3 programs provide training in literacy, math, and other basic skills for out-of-school youth through initiatives such as Liberia's Accelerated Learning Program.

**Youth & HIV/AIDS:** Almost half of all new HIV infections in developing countries are among 15 to 24 year-olds. USAID is using media campaigns, peer counseling, life skills training, and interventions for youth in particularly vulnerable circumstances. These kinds of activities are designed to reach young people with prevention messages and help them develop the skills necessary to protect themselves.

**Youth & Civic Participation:** Enhancing youth civic participation is key to creating an environment supportive of civil society, especially in countries with fragile democratic traditions.

**Youth & Microenterprise:** USAID's Microenterprise Development Office collaborates with field practitioners and programs to develop, implement, and assess the impact of market-oriented strategies that advance the economic situation of youth. The Youth Livelihoods program within the MicroLinks activity is an example of such programs.

**Youth & Post-Conflict Stability:** USAID's Conflict Management and Mitigation Office is helping USAID to engage young people often left behind by more traditional development programs. Programs such as USAID/Middle East's

Developing Leaders Program reintegrate former child soldiers, create opportunities for youth to participate in community and political arenas, and provide job training.

**Youth & Workforce Development:** USAID's Workforce Development programs focus on developing youth employability skills, such as critical thinking and facility with computer technology, as well as specific technical and vocational skills, in response to industry workforce demands through programs like USAID/East Timor's JOB Opportunities Project.

**Youth Livelihoods:** Livelihood development programming, such as USAID/Haiti's IDEJEN project, aims to enhance the readiness of young people to engage in livelihoods activities, such as employment, household-based activities, self-employment micro-enterprise activities.

**Youth Policy:** USAID is one of the few development agencies that have made youth policy an explicit part of their programming, within USAID's broader health policy initiative. It supports youth-policy.com, an online resource for improving youth reproductive health and HIV/AIDS policy worldwide. Among others, this resource base includes a searchable database containing 131 full-text policies addressing youth reproductive health from 49 countries.

#### 1525. UNITED NATIONS POPULATION FUND (UNFPA)

UNFPA promotes and protects the rights of young people. It envisions a world in which adolescents and young people of both sexes have optimal opportunities to develop their full potential, to freely express themselves and have their views respected, and to live free of poverty, discrimination, and violence. UNFPA works to empower adolescents and youth and promote health, including sexual and reproductive health. UNFPA takes a holistic, multisectoral, collaborative approach, framing adolescent and youth issues within the larger development context of poverty reduction. Its programs advocate for an essential package of social protection interventions for youth that includes education, sexual and reproductive health services, support for establishing livelihoods, and intergenerational alliances.

To achieve this, UNFPA works across sectors and with many partners to:

- empower adolescents and youth with skills to achieve their dreams, think critically, and express themselves freely;
- promote health by giving youth access to sexual and reproductive health information, education, commodities, and services;
- connect young people to livelihood and employment programs;
- uphold the rights of young people, especially girls and marginalized groups, to grow up healthy and safe so that they can receive a fair share of social investments;
- encourage young people's leadership and participation in decisions that affect them, including the development plans of their societies.

Its main areas of operational work with or on youth and adolescents are youth participation, education and empowerment, youth-friendly sexual and reproductive health services, policy initiatives, adolescent girls, HIV/AIDS, managing in times of crisis, and international agreements.

Y-PEER is a comprehensive youth-to-youth initiative pioneered by the UNFPA. Y-PEER is a network of more than 600 nonprofit organizations, schools, and governmental institutions; its membership includes more than 7,300 young people from 40 countries who work in the many areas of adolescent sexual and reproductive health. Members of Y-PEER include young people who are active peer educators, trainers of trainers and youth advocates for adolescent sexual and reproductive health. These young people contribute to and benefit from the resource materials, tools, training programs, and campaigns provided by the Y-PEER networks nationally and internationally.

Y-PEER is based on person-to-person meetings, and electronic communication via an interactive website and national and international listservs. The website and listservs provide peer educators with access to state-of-the-art information on peer education, prevention of STIs and HIV/AIDS, and other sexual and reproductive health-related topics. Y-PEER also offers computer-based distance learning courses; hosts training events, campaigns, workshops and videoconferences; and produces tools that facilitate peer

education, youth-adult partnerships, “edutainment,” and youth advocacy. It builds partnerships in order to advocate for national youth development strategies; increased access to information, knowledge, and services on sexual and reproductive health; the sharing of lessons learned across borders and between cultures; standards of practice and improved training resources for peer educators; and the strengthening of the knowledge base of peer educators and trainers of trainers.



Africa Development Corps (ADC), formerly known as Visions in Action (VIA), was founded by Shaun Skelton, Andre LeCann and Charles Mutisya in 1989. While lecturing on management at the University of Nairobi during the 1988-89 school year, Shaun discovered that nonprofit organizations in Kenya had a great need for different types of volunteers; ones who worked in an urban setting, at a computer in an office, designing brochures and writing funding proposals, as opposed to the more traditional rural field work. There was a need for volunteers in nontraditional sectors of development, such as human rights, democratization and journalism. For 25 years Africa Development Corps has fulfilled this need by sending volunteers to the developing world to work for grassroots organizations working in these sectors.

The US office opened in September 1989 in a large group house in northwest Washington DC. In setting up its housing in urban Africa, ADC followed the community group house model of the Jesuit Volunteer Corps in US cities. From an initial 15 volunteer placements in Kenya, over the years more than 700 volunteers have participated in Africa Development Corps programs overseas. Revenue comes from program fees, individual donations, in-kind support, foundation grants, donor grants and special events. In the US, ADC is headquartered in the Adams Morgan area of Washington, DC, an ethnically diverse neighborhood of the city and the heart of its Latin American community. Although still primarily an urban program, Africa Development Corps has expanded its geographical areas of intervention and now offers some possibilities of rural placement. Africa Development Corps currently has five active programs in Africa: Liberia, Tanzania, Uganda, Rwanda and Ethiopia.





W. Eugene Smith learned the hard way that photography could be too easy, a matter of making expert images of interesting subjects. He set himself to learn the truth – about himself as well as his subjects. In the process, he produced a series of photographic essays, for LIFE and other publications, whose passionate involvement set a standard for what photography can be. Gene Smith was a loner, a driving and driven man, who bucked the system of which he was a part. Some say he sacrificed his career, and himself, on an altar of self-destructive idealism. When he died at the age of 59 in 1978, he had \$18 in the bank. But his name had become synonymous with integrity. His work was his memorial.

The Fund was established in 1979 to seek out and encourage these independent voices. In the first thirty years of competition, from many thousands of proposals, the Fund selected 303 finalists who were seeking help in finishing major projects. Each was worthy of a grant. Between 1980 and 2009, thirty-two recipients from fourteen different countries were recognized.

#### 1589. WORLD BANK IN THE ASIA-PACIFIC REGION

The World Bank has identified two main issues as the key priorities for governments in the Asia-Pacific region and its own work with youth. First, youth unemployment rates may be up to four times the adult rate in some countries. Often a primary reason is that, while many youth in the region may have access to primary education, there is little access to secondary or tertiary education, resulting in inadequate skills. Even those youth who do benefit from higher education may find their skills to be irrelevant, as the education system may not be geared toward meeting the demands of the labor market. The need to reform education systems in the region is not helped by the decrease in spending on education over recent years. Second, conflict and instability have also affected youth prospects because of the effect on the economy, interruption of education, government failure to provide basic services, and youth who may play a key role in the instability, whether fighting for independence in Timor-Leste, protesting government repression in Indonesia, or engaging in criminal activities as part of street gangs in Papua New Guinea.

In addressing these problems faced by young people, the World Bank has developed a mix of programs to work with youth in the East Asia and Pacific region:

**Grants:** World Bank offices in some countries provide grants focused on youth. In Cambodia, for example, NGOs that engage youth may apply to receive grants from the Small Grants Program. Vietnam Innovation Day 2006 and the Papua New Guinea Development Marketplace 2006 also gave grants.

to organizations with the most innovative ideas dealing with youth-focused development challenges.

**Training:** Some offices also engage in training programs for youth. In China, for example, the World Bank is involved in peer education programs for HIV/AIDS prevention, and in training young women in rural areas to increase their employability.

**Dialogues:** Bank offices throughout the region engage youth in dialogue about development at the local level, for example, through the Public Information Centers, information-sharing workshops, and internships, and also by connecting youth across countries through the Global Distance Learning Network.

#### 1590. WORLD BANK: REACHING AFRICA'S YOUNG (RAY)

Within World Bank, the Africa region was the first to develop a strategic framework to focus on the needs of children and youth using a life cycle framework. The RAY strategic plan for 2005–15 proposes a three-pronged strategy to scale up action in three priority groups, one focusing on young people at risk, two focusing on different categories of children. Currently it is estimated that out

of Africa's US\$3.4 billion human development portfolio in the period from 1998 through 2002, some \$2.4 billion reached the infant to 24 years age groups, but only \$240 million targeted the most vulnerable groups. RAY envisions significant scaling up of analytical work, capacity building, and lending using existing instruments (e.g., multicountry AIDS programs, Poverty Reduction Support Credits (PRSCs), education programs, health programs, social funds, urban programs) as well as new instruments (e.g., conditional cash transfers, safety nets, community financing, and subregional programs).

Land Purchase for Conservation

**General goals:**

World Land Trust (WLT) is an international conservation charity, which protects the world's most biologically important and threatened habitats acre by acre. Since its foundation in 1989, WLT has funded partner organisations around the world to create reserves, and give permanent protection to habitats and wildlife.

Our mission:

- To protect and sustainably manage natural ecosystems of the world; to conserve their biodiversity, with emphasis on threatened habitats and endangered species
- To develop partnerships with local individuals, communities and organisations; to engage support and commitment among the people who live in project areas
- To raise awareness, in the UK and elsewhere, of the need for conservation; to improve understanding and generate support through education, information and fundraising

**Areas of support:**

The majority of World Land Trust projects involve the acquisition or protection of land. When selecting projects, a number of specific criteria are used to ensure that the project falls within WLT's mission, and also looks at practical considerations, to ensure that the project is likely to succeed in its aims.

**1. Conservation Value:**

Conservation value is first and foremost, the most important aspect of all World Land Trust (WLT) projects. Conservation value takes into account biodiversity within the project area (the number and

variety of different species) and the level of threat of individual species. Also considered is the size of the reserve and the impact it will have on the surrounding land. Of particular importance here is whether the land connects with other wildlife reserves, to create a greater network of protected areas. The possible effects of climate change must also be considered. Lastly, consequential impacts, such as training for local people and sustainability programmes are considered, which will contribute to the long-term protection of the reserve.

## **2. Location**

The selection of a project is not restricted by its location, as long as all other criteria are met. However, WLT would not normally consider projects within developed countries.

## **3. Feasibility Criteria (to assess likelihood of success)**

This includes the practical aspects of the project selection, such as the actual availability of land that can be purchased, whether the project is within WLT's financial capability, and whether the cost of the project reflects its overall conservation value within its location. It is always essential that WLT carries out its projects in partnership with a local organization, with similar objectives to the Trust, and with the skills and capacity to manage the project. Commitment to the partnership is given through a non-legally binding agreement (a Memorandum of Understanding) that outlines the expectations and responsibilities of both partners.

Lastly, the criteria address the exit options available for the project. The aim of each project is for WLT to provide support for the local organization to carry out project objectives, but with the ideal outcome for the project to continue, independent of WLT. To do this, project objectives must consider opportunities for the long-term future.

## **4. Absence of adequate funding from other sources**

As a small organization, WLT is conscious that donations from supporters are spent in the most valuable way possible. Something that the Trust is keen to avoid is the duplication of efforts or funding in a particular project area, when there are many worthy project sites worldwide that require support. As a result, WLT will only support projects knowing that support is not available from other sources.

## **5. Feedback in support of the Trust's further activities**

This considers the publicity value of the project, and the potential for fundraising. Often, supporters write to the Trust voicing support for a particular location or species, suggestions that are taken into consideration when choosing projects. The potential for future land acquisition and/or research projects is also taken into consideration.

### **Application procedures:**

WLT differs from most other international NGOs. It emphasises the importance of supporting local conservation groups and always working through local partners. Unlike the majority of international organisations WLT does not put its own staff in charge of operations, but relies on local expertise.

WLT depends on voluntary donations to assist with land purchases. Although WLT raises funds for purchase overseas, the management and ultimate ownership is with the appointed local conservation group.

WLT is strongly opposed to “green colonialism”. WLT assists with technical expertise, such as marketing, fundraising and publicity when requested, but wherever possible supports the development of local expertise, by funding study tours and training.

WLT encourages small-scale, sustainable development, so that projects can become financially independent. This is in contrast to many international projects that have lavish funding initially, but are not sustainable without grant aid.

WLT believes that it is important to be able to quantify results, and that the area of land now under active conservation by WLT’s partners is the best ambassador an organisation can have.

WLT does not hoard reserves of cash – it tries to have enough funds for three months operation, but believes it should spend as much as possible on land purchase and management, and the development of sustainable income for the reserve.

The VCP focuses on meeting the needs of Members through direct financing, and / or transfer of expertise and technology between Members. Since its inception, the programme has been successful in providing significant support to mainly developing and least developed countries. Its success is due largely to the willingness of WMO Members to share scientific knowledge and the latest technological advances. While the donor countries provide equipment, fellowships, expertise and financing, the recipient countries ensure their effective use by providing considerable counterpart contributions from national resources, such as local infrastructure, staffing and operational costs. WMO is striving to expand this network by creating more linkages among NMHSs, bringing more members into the programme and therefore strengthening the spirit of cooperation and friendship.

### Areas of support:

- to contribute to shaping the World Bank's collaboration on C&Y issues with other international agencies and donors;

- **The Civil Society Fund (CSF)**

CSF (formerly known as the Small Grants Program) is managed out of approximately 70 countries with some 400 grants awarded annually. A grant—averaging US\$4,000—provides seed funding for innovative activities that enable citizens' groups to initiate programs that enhance and influence development outcomes. The program emphasizes activities that strengthen partnerships with the public and the private sectors, as well as with other civil society organizations. Youth civic engagement remains a high priority, as many Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) chose to focus their CSF activities on youth. In FY08 CSF began to manage a US\$3 million dollar grants portfolio of the Global Public-Private Partnership and Multi-Donor Trust Fund for Youth Investment.

Because innovative work in uncertain and fragile conflict-affected societies is often not possible through normal World Bank funding sources, the PCF supports planning, piloting, and analysis of groundbreaking activities by funding government and partner organizations in the forefront of this work. The emphasis is on speed and flexibility without sacrificing quality.

PCF was established in 1997 to enhance the World Bank's ability to support countries in transition from conflict to sustainable peace and economic growth. The PCF makes grants to a wide range of partners (institutions, NGOs, UN agencies, transitional authorities, governments, and other civil society institutions) to provide earlier and broader World Bank assistance to conflict-affected countries.

1605. **WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION, DEPARTMENT OF  
CHILD AND ADOLESCENT HEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT  
(CAH)**

CAH envisions a world in which children and adolescents enjoy the highest attainable standard of health and development, a world that meets their needs and respects their rights, enabling them to live to their full potential. CAH promotes the physical and mental health of adolescents, and aims to reduce by 25% HIV prevalence among young people ages 15 to 24 years by 2010. The CAH's work is guided by the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). CAH works to strengthen the tracking of adolescent health issues by developing and disseminating evidence for action to policy makers and program managers, by advocating for concerted action based on evidence, and by providing technical assistance to support a systematic approach to scaling up the provision and use of quality health services to adolescents. This work includes developing consensus among key stakeholders, developing national standards for adolescent and youth-friendly health services, and supporting efforts to achieve these standards by:

- Training health workers to deal with adolescents effectively and sensitively;
- making health facilities welcoming to adolescents; and
- generating adolescent demand for health services and community acceptance for their provision.

In addition, CAH supports the collection and analysis of data to monitor implementation and progress towards global goals and targets of relevance to adolescents. CAH works with other units in the World Health Organization (WHO) and in partnership with sister agencies such as UNFPA and UNICEF, as well as those outside the UN system.

- **Global Youth Network for Road Safety**

A Global Road Safety Facility has been established in collaboration with the World Bank. The three-year project will disburse US\$10 million through two separate funding streams, one for global work and one for national work. The project will initially be managed by the World Bank, with

Advisory input from a number of partner organizations. In 2008, WHO received a grant to support the establishment of a formal youth-led network for road safety. It is planned that this network will evolve into a fully fledged NGO. A taskforce has been created to give guidance on overall strategic direction and to help the network define its mission, goals, objectives, and activities. The youth network is currently represented on the UN Road Safety Collaboration by the vice chair of the April 2007 World Youth Assembly for Road Safety. On 25–26 March 2009, WHO hosted the first meeting of the taskforce, which is comprised of young road safety leaders from Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, The Gambia, Lebanon, and the U.S. Most were nominated as their country's official delegate to the April 2007 World Youth Assembly for Road Safety. The creation of the global network is a direct follow-up to this high profile global advocacy event. The network aims to support young road safety advocates in all countries by increasing collaboration across global, regional, and local levels. During the two-day meeting, the taskforce discussed the opportunities and challenges presented by creation of the Global Youth Network.

#### **1606. WESTMINSTER FOUNDATION FOR DEMOCRACY (WFD)**

The WFD works to achieve sustainable political change in emerging democracies. It is an independent political foundation, sponsored by the United Kingdom Foreign and Commonwealth Office. Working with and through partner 65 1.2 International Foundations and Organizations Providing Financing for Youth and Youth-Related Projects

organizations, it seeks to strengthen the institutions of democracy, principally political parties, parliaments, and the range of institutions that make up civil society—nongovernmental organizations (NGOs), trade unions, free media, etc. WFD supports activities in the fields of local government, civic participation, women, youth, elections, rule of law, media, and trade unions. In many of the countries in

which WFD is supporting democratic change, the key to progress is the talent and energy of the young people. WFD has supported numerous projects with young people, such as leadership training for young activists and projects encouraging youth to be engaged in political life and the development of their communities. Applications for funding are accepted on a rolling basis according to annually identified priorities for each country or region. Initial contact is made with the WFD staff member or team in the region, then funding opportunities are explored.

Two examples of youth-specific projects funded by WFD are:

- **The Liberal Democrats & Youth Training in Africa:** The Liberal Democrats organized a youth training workshop for the Africa Liberal Network. This project brought together leaders of political youth groups from 13 African countries, ranging from Angola to Morocco and Tanzania in Lusaka, Zambia, and 14 political parties. The program focused on developing the participants' campaign skills. The mix of governing and opposition parties, and parties from southern, east, and west Africa allowed an effective exchange of ideas and solutions. The use of African (as well as UK) trainers—both independent and from partner parties—made it possible to focus on capacity building and finding local solutions to local problems. Participants improved their skills in public speaking, communication, building and leading a team, working with the media, organizing election campaigns, presentation, and identifying issues. In a mock press conference, they quizzed fellow participants posing as journalists in the audience. This exercise allowed the delegates to practice some of the skills learned, and additional one-to-one interviews recorded on-camera and then reviewed let the participants see their progress.
- **Training Young Political Leaders in Moldova:** Political party leadership practices in Moldova lack value-based standards for promoting individuals and ideas, making it difficult for young activists to participate fully in party activities, to make a contribution to the party, and steadily assume greater responsibility. Political leaders and elites are reluctant to share power, which has led to fragmentation of the political scene. Opportunities for young politicians are limited to basic campaign activities. WFD supported a project that provided youth members of Moldovan political parties with the ability to assert themselves within their organizations. It also aimed to strengthen political parties through empowering young party leaders and to promote a value-based and democratic party system in Moldova. Activities included leadership training sessions for young party members and civil society activists, as well as a summer school with a mock electoral campaign. The knowledge acquired by the participants enabled them to conduct follow-up activities within their parties. One activist conducted training for other youth members of her party, while another hosted a summer school for young activists from rural areas. Numerous participants were also subsequently promoted within their parties; some are now running as candidates in different elections, one has been appointed deputy chair of their party's youth branch, and one non-party participant has joined the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

- reach out to work with disadvantaged youth, as well as marginalized and underrepresented groups in society;
- promote of gender equality and human rights by ending discrimination.

Through the Emergence Fellowship, YSEI invests in young visionaries who have big ideas and who need crucial startup support to turn their ideas into action. The startup support includes financing of up to US\$15,000, development knowledge and tools on social entrepreneurship, technical consulting through mentorship, and access to diverse networks. Current fellowship projects include:

**Elevyn, Malaysia:** This project supports artisans in remote areas of Malaysia. To generate income on a fair trade basis, Elevyn is using an innovative, web 2.0-based, online platform that links the selling of handmade products to the support of social and environmental causes.

**LetIThelp, Philippines:** LetIThelp solves structural unemployment and underemployment problems in poor communities by providing capacity building on specific IT skills that are in market demand and match trainees to job opportunities.

**Microfinancejobs, India:** This project develops an online jobs platform to bridge the gap between 1,500 microfinance institutions in India and 10,000 professionals who would be willing to work in the microfinance field.

**Mobile Telecenters, Philippines:** Most public school students in Manila have limited or no access to computers and the Internet. Mobile Telecenters provides onsite information- and-communications-technology (ICT) skills training and career opportunities to over 6,000 students by using ICT tools adapted to a tricycle.

**Open Dream, Thailand:** The project provides low-cost web and application development services to social groups and organizations by leveraging the network of social software developers for project collaboration.

YEN is a partnership of the United Nations, the International Labor Organization, and the World Bank. YEN was created in 2001 to mobilize action on

the commitment of the Millennium Summit for decent and productive work for young people. YEN is a global platform to prioritize youth employment on the development agenda and to exchange ideas on policies and programs to improve employment opportunities for youth. The network includes development agencies, governments, the private sector, youth groups, and other NGOs. To date, YEN has mobilized US\$7 million for its activities, with current support from the Swedish International Development Agency (Sida) and the UK Department of Work and Pensions. It has developed and disseminated various publications and advocacy products on youth employment, and trained over 1,500 youth representatives as advocates on youth employment. In Africa, YEN operates several programs.

Competitive Grant Scheme supports youth employment projects in the Mano River Union (MRU) (Côte d'Ivoire, Guinea, Liberia, and Sierra Leone). The program identifies and supports small-scale, innovative projects with potential to provide employment opportunities for young people while allowing youth organizations to actively participate in development. Youth organizations have firsthand experience of the needs of young people but need financial or technical support to reach their goals. Grants of US\$2,000 to \$50,000 are awarded to projects that contribute to youth employment in several areas: community projects and services, transition from school to work, vocational training for young people, youth entrepreneurship, and economic empowerment of young women.

The selection criteria for projects supported under the Competitive Grant Scheme are:

- **Target:** aim at improving the employment opportunities for young people between the ages of 15 and 30.
- **Innovation:** extent to which the proposed project differs from existing approaches. YEN is particularly interested in projects that introduce a new approach, process, or technology.
- **Sustainability:** organizational capacity and expertise to continue the activities after the end of grant funding.
- **Results and Measurability:** well-defined and quantifiable outcomes and outputs.
- **Growth Potential:** potential of the project to be applied on a larger scale or replicated elsewhere.
- **Partnerships:** potential to initiate strategic alliances and bring different stakeholders together.
- **Gender equity:** promote inclusion and active participation of young women.

The **Private Sector Initiative (PSI)** is a project of YEN's subregional office for West Africa. The PSI is a multistakeholder platform for business action on youth employment supported by the UK's Department of Work and Pensions. The PSI aims to strengthen the role that business in West Africa can play in enhancing employment opportunities for youth. To achieve this task, the initiative is divided into three areas of action. Under knowledge development, it seeks to take stock of existing and planned business sponsored youth employment interventions. Under network building, it brings together private sector representatives and civil society organizations to advocate for and share experiences on business support for youth employment. Finally, this project works closely with its network partners to match business interests in the field of youth employment with existing or possible intersectoral partnerships on youth employment in the subregion.

#### 1613. **YOUTH ACTION INTERNATIONAL (YAI)**

YAI is a global nonprofit effort to rebuild war-torn African communities. YAI is run by a network of young international leaders who are defining a new approach to delivering humanitarian aid. By leveraging the use of local materials and employing local people, YAI maximizes the economic and social impact of programs that include building schools and playgrounds as well as microlending. It runs projects in Liberia, Sierra Leone, and Uganda. Specific program activities include small business development (including microloans), vocational training, agriculture and farming support, targeted scholarships, and health care and awareness raising. In 2008, YAI had an operating budget of approximately US\$350,000, funded by USAID, corporate and individual donors in the U.S., and several American foundations. YAI has three main thematic orientations:

**Early Childhood Development Program:** targets children between ages 5 and 12 and focuses on positive early childhood development by providing basic individual and school-related necessities, homework assistance and support, and safe, structured environments for play and learning. Specific program activities include after-school programming, teacher training, school and library construction, support to orphaned and abandoned children and youth, financial literacy support, and medical assistance.

**“Opportunity Meets Preparation” Program for Women:** targets women ages 13 to 32. This program focuses on supporting the needs and development of women affected by war and girls at risk of sexual exploitation or domestic violence. It aims to equip and prepare young girls and women with information and opportunities that can allow for self-sufficiency and independence. Specific program activities include workshops and training sessions geared at women's capacity building, microcredit and startup

kits to help women to start their own businesses, and information on primary childcare as well as maternal health issues.

**Youth Development and Empowerment Program:** targets 13 to 32 year-olds and focuses on promoting the wellbeing and empowerment of war-affected youths, former child soldiers, formerly abducted children, and children associated with fighting forces. Specific program activities include vocational and job training and placement, the promotion of youth talent in the arts and sports, agriculture and farming support, youth resource centers, training in program development and management, and scholarship initiative for university education.

YAI operates in three nations.

*Liberia:* YAI operates two programs in the country. Within its early childhood development program, YAI supports a school library in Gardnersville, the Becky Primary School in the Kakata community, and several orphanages and playgrounds. Under the youth development and empowerment programs, YAI assists women's centers, a former child soldiers reintegration and health project, youth and computer resource centers, and others.

*Sierra Leone:* The early childhood development program organizes play-based workshops to train financial literacy, and provides teacher training and supplies to schools in the Waterloo Refugee Camp as well as the Milton Margai School for the Blind. The youth development and empowerment programs assist a project to reclaim lands devastated by mining in Kono district and to make land available to young people, and supports a women's center in Freetown that provides training and microcredit loans to 150 women.

*Uganda:* The MYDEL vocational skills training program provides training to the marginalized youth in slum areas in Kampala. The Rakai agriculture initiative provides 150 families with seeds for subsistence farming. Later support is planned to develop community grain stores and support animal farming in the community of Rakai. The Jinja community empowerment program is an income-generating project for 2,500 people in the Jinja district. The Gulu empowerment program supports 50 formerly abducted child-mothers with seed money for starting businesses to improve on their lives. The Amuru youth empowerment program helps 45 young people to start commercial honey production.

The Norwegian Nobel Institute was established in 1904, and moved into its present building in central Oslo, close to the royal palace, in 1905. The building, which was built in 1867, is a classic mansion house. It was bought in 1903 from consul Christian Christophersen, a prominent figure in the booming business life of Kristiania (the name of the Norwegian capital until 1924) in the 1890s. A private house consisting of two separate apartments, it had to be totally renovated inside before the Institute could start using it. By Norwegian standards in 1905, the Nobel Institute was both fashionable and expensive; at that time some people criticized the Nobel Foundation for spending too much money on a building. However, the same criticism could hardly be maintained 50, 60, or even 70 years later. Little was done to keep up appearances before 1985, when the Nobel Foundation initiated a second renovation of the whole building. The principal duty of the Nobel Institute is to assist the [Nobel Committee](#) in the task of selecting the recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize and to organize the annual Nobel events in Oslo. In order to serve as a center of knowledge related to peace and international affairs in general, the Institute has built up what is today a 175,000-volume library. The literature which is available at the Nobel Institute Library is chiefly devoted to work for peace, international relations, law, and economics, and modern political history.






